Paddling pool will stay shut this summer

THE POPULAR paddling pool at Riverside Meadows will not be opening this year, Stourport-on-Severn Town Council has revealed.

Repairs have been identified which need to be undertaken on the pipework underneath the summer season attraction and a plan is currently being developed by the authority

But, the council conceded, there would not be time to complete the work that is needed in time for this

year's season. Instead, the council is aiming to have the pool open, ready for the start of summer in 2026.

A spokesperson for Stourport-on-Severn Town Council said the authority recognised the Riverside Paddling Pool was a valuable asset to the town that was both cherished by both residents and visitors.

They added the council had been

working closely with contractors to develop a plan for the pool's reopening.

"However, after careful consideration, we regret to announce that the Riverside Paddling Pool will not open this year," they said. "The required repairs must be

carried out by specialist contrac-tors, whose availability means the work cannot be completed before the end of summer.

"The paddling pool will re-open at

the start of summer 2026. "Our contractors have advised

that a sustained period of clear, dry weather will be necessary to re-lay the pool's surface.

They added that – given its location near the River Severn – there was a possibility that flooding may further impact the timeline.

"Stourport-on-Severn Council would like to reassure residents and visitors that we take our responsibilities seriously.

"This decision was not made lightly and has undergone full and careful consideration.

Officer hands in resignation over cover-up

POLICE officer based at Kidderminster Police Station would have been dismissed had he not already resigned, it was revealed at a misconduct hear-

revealed at a misconduct hearing.

Sgt Harjit Singh, aged 48, and former PC Samuel Mitchell, 28, were found to seriously breach the honesty and integrity standards set out in the Police (Conduct) Regulations 2020, amounting to trees misconduct.

Regulations 2020, amounting to gross misconduct.

The officers were based in a response team at Kidderminster Police Station.

On July 4, 2022, PC Mitchell was driving a marked police vehicle, above the speed limit. He activated a speed camera and was issued with a speed camera and was issued with

a speeding ticket.

The Road Traffic Act exempts emergency vehicles from observing speed limits to lawfully undertake

PC Mitchell submitted and signed an exemption request on the basis that he has been trying to stop a vehicle which had been involved in an incident. This was not the case

he had no lawful exemption from

speeding.
Sgt Singh signed to support the exemption form knowing it contained false information. A third officer was found to have no case to answer.

"Behaviour like this undermines public confidence in policing and we make no apology for rooting out individuals who did meet the standards the public rightly expect."

Sgt Singh has been dismissed with immediate effect and will be

added to the College of Policing Barred List. Former PC Mitchell resigned from his role in January 2024 and will be added to the College of Policing Barred List. The Barred List pre-vents those added to it from ever working for a UK police service. The outcome of the hearing is

subject to the normal appeals proc-



These are payable on the day, subject to availability, or can be pre-booked on the svr.co.uk website where there are timetables and further information on the Model Railway Weekend.





Significant finds as police raid barbershops across the county

MORE THAN \$500,000 has been seized by police in West Mercia as dozens of barbershops were raided as part of a national crackdown on criminal gangs using the businesses as fronts for fraudulent activities.

The campaign, known as Operation Machinize, saw efforts from forces across the nation to

tackle criminals using barbershops as fronts for fraud, money laundering, and the sale of illicit goods.

As part of the operation, 33 war-rants were executed across West Mercia, focusing on gangs exploit-ing barbershops to conceal illegal cash flow. While these businesses appeared legitimate, they were, in

were, in reality, tools for financial crime.
Working alongside Trading Standards, West Midlands Fire and Rescue, Home Office Immigration, and Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, the force seized over \$500,000 in illegal funds and \$16,000 in cash and arrested four

Additionally, Trading Standards carried out three warrants, and Home Office Immigration questioned three individuals about their immigration status. Proceeds of crime

West Mercia Police's Economic Crime Unit is leading the force's efforts nationally in tackling financial crime. Since April 2024, more than £6million in criminal assets have been seized, disrupting the financial networks that support organised crime.

Det Insp Dan Fenn, from our Economic Crime team, said: "Organised crime groups are opportunistic and exploit legitimate businesses, such as barbershops, to hide their illegal cash flow.

"The high cash turnover of these businesses makes them ideal for disguising illicit activities.

"Our work during Operation Machinize sends a clear message to these crime networks - we will not tolerate criminal activity in our communities.

Following these warrants, 34 intelligence reports have been submitted, helping to build a stronger intelligence picture and supporting future operations.

"Community intelligence played a

key role in this operation.
"Some of the information used to plan these raids came from public





The training is delivered by specialist practitioners at Worcestershire County Council's Autism and Complex Communication Needs (CCN) team.
One of the programme's success

stories comes from Ethan, a pupil at The Chase High School in Malvern, who benefited from the support of his mentor Mr Griffin.

He said: "It's just been a good

time, when I've had stress with various things, to just tell Mr Griffin and share what was bothering me and come up with ideas to solve whatever the issue is.

whatever the issue is.

The training empowers school staff with a special interest in autism to become mentors, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to support pupils in understanding their diagnosis through a personalised and supportive approach.

Dawn, Ethan's mother, highlights the programme's value in reducing

anxiety.

She said: "For a lot of autistic children and adults, anxiety plays a huge part in our lives, and it can be quite a barrier to learning.
"Having that mentor

reduce that anxiety puts those barriers to learning down and I think allows them to really thrive."

Worcestershire County Council

is highlighting the impact these autism mentors have on autistic children and young people.

April's World Autism Awareness

Starling's decline is startling as Birdwatch results are revealed

STARLINGS have dropped out of the list of the UK's top three garden birds after a national spotting scheme saw the lowest number of the species ever recorded.

the species ever recorded.

The species has fallen from number three to four in the RSPB's latest UK-wide Big Garden Birdwatch results after 600,000 people took part in the wildlife survey across the UK.

House Sparrow held onto the UK

House Sparrow held onto the UK top spot once again and the Blue Tit remains at number two, with Woodpigeon in third.

More than 9million birds and

More than 9million birds and over 80 species were spotted during this year's Big Garden Birdwatch between January 24 and 26.

Valuable insight

The scheme is a citizen science survey founded in 1979, providing an annual snapshot of garden birds in the UK.

Participants are asked to count the maximum number of each species recorded at their chosen location - gardens or parks or other green spaces - during a one-hour period.

Teachers and pupils can also take

part in Big Schools' Birdwatch, which reached more than 100,000 participants this year for the first time ever

Locally, over 9,500 Worcestershire residents and more than 4,700 people from Warwickshire took part.

Worcestershire and Warwickshire's top threes were the same as the UK's.

In the West Midlands, the

In the West Midlands, the Woodpigeon was the most popular with House Sparrow in second and Blue Tit in third.


Starlings ranked as the eighth most commonly spotted bird in Worcestershire, it was fifth in Warwickshire and seventh in the West Midlands.

Massive decline

Starlings are medium-sized birds with glossy plumage that has a purple and green sheen, often with white spots during winter. They are also excellent mimics and can make a huge variety of tweets, cheeps and clicks.

They can be found across the UK with their numbers swelling during winter when birds arrive from northern Europe, gathering together to perform spectacular murmurations.

Despite these displays sometimes reaching hundreds of thousands of individuals, Starlings are a red listed species in the UK and considered a high conservation concern due to



their declining numbers.

Although there is not currently enough evidence to confirm what is causing these decreases, the UK breeding population declined by 82 per cent between 1970 and 2022.
Prior to 2000, the Starling was regularly the most numerous species recorded in the Big Garden

Overall, the survey provides a valuable snapshot of how our most common garden birds are faring and taking part is one important way to help birds and nature.

The RSPB's chief executive, Beccy Speight said: "Starlings are one of our most charismatic garden birds, but this year's Big Garden Birdwatch results is a reason for concern.

"With one in six species at risk of extinction from Great Britain, we've done more damage to our natural UK than we realise.

"However, we can all do our bit to support these threatened birds by taking small actions that can not only benefit Starlings, but a wealth of other garden wildlife.

"Our countryside, our farms and our towns all need support to encourage nature, and while our homes and gardens often provide the perfect place for individual people to help, we also urgently need governments and businesses to join us in the wider fight to restore our natural UK."

Warning to dog owners about the dangers of Easter chocolate

AS THE Easter break and festivities get under way pet owners are being warned to keep traditional goodies such as chocolate eggs and hot cross buns – out of reach of their animals to avoid emergency yet visits

emergency vet visits.

The British Veterinary Association has issued the warning which comes as statistics from the Veterinary Poisons Information Service (VPIS), which provides emergency advice to veterinary professionals about poisoning cases and runs Animal PoisonLine for owners, reveals it received over 100 enquiries about animals eating chocolate last Easter.

It added that half of the enquiries it received were about pets ingesting hot cross buns, which contain vine fruits that are poisonous to many animals, also unsurprisingly come at Easter.

Although 80 per cent of enquiries related to chocolate ingestion involved dogs, it was not just cheeky canines who bit off more than they could chew - the VPIS reports 15 per cent of enquiries about chocolate ingestion related to cats and three per cent to rabbits.

'Serious danger'



Chocolate, especially dark chocolate, can be dangerous for all pets.

Dogs, however, are particularly susceptible to poisoning due to a chemical called theobromine, which is found naturally in cocoa beans.

Theobromine takes a long time to be broken down inside a dog's digestive system, which means that even small amounts of chocolate can potentially result in toxic levels, especially for smaller dogs and puppies.

Although white chocolate is usually safer for dogs if ingested accidentally, milk and dark chocolate can cause poisoning, so it's better to err on the side of caution and keep all types of chocolate away.

Raisins and sultanas, found in hot cross buns and simnel cakes, and xylitol (found in sugar-free treats) can also be dangerous for dogs if intested

ingested.
British Veterinary Association junior vice president Rob Williams said: "Chocolate eggs and hot cross buns are just a few of the treats which spring onto the shelves at this time of year.
"While they are delicious for us.

"While they are delicious for us, the VPIS statistics show they are also tempting – but toxic - to our pets.

"Many of us will know the dangers that chocolate presents to dogs, but other pets such as cats and rabbits can also become seriously unwell if they eat it, while hot cross buns also contain vine fruits which is particularly toxic too.

particularly toxic too.
"It's best to make sure that all sweet treats and tempting titbits are kept out of reach of your pets to avoid emergency vet visits, but if you think your pet has eaten something they shouldn't, it's really important that you speak to your vet – it could save their life."

Recognise the signs

The British Veterinary Association said symptoms of chocolate poisoning usually appear within 12 hours of ingestion and can last for up to three days.

Initially, pets are likely to experience excessive thirst, vomiting, diarrhoea and restlessness.

These can develop into symptoms of hyperactivity, tremors, increased heart rate, hyperthermia and rapid breathing.

Severe cases may result in fits and heartbeat irregularities, and even coma and death. If you notice these symptoms in your dog and suspect chocolate ingestion, seek veterinary advice as soon as possible.






