Can you help give Dottie her voice?

A RALLYING call has been issued for the community to get behind a fundraiser for specialist equipment to help a two-year-old non-verbal girl find her voice.

Dottie Loveridge from Stourport was born with a genetic neurological condition, cysts on the brain and autism which means she is unable to understand or communicate with the world around her.

Despite her daily challenges, her mum Gemma said she was still the happiest, funny, cutest and most loving little girl many people would

Now she, her family and friends are trying to raise \$8,000 to fund a communication tablet device and assistant eve tracker which would enable Dottie to communicate and understand those closest to her. It will also provide ongoing help with her developmental delays and disabilities.

Gemma has also been informed of specialist treatment that is available for her in the US which could poten tially transform her life and quality

The start of the fundraising journey will begin with a special 'Give Dottie Her Voice' event at the Severns Club in Stourport from 3pm to 7pm next Saturday, May 3.

The event will feature local DJ

SoulCarrot and other live music acts, along with games, raffles, a tombola, bottle raffle, cake sale, face painting



Gemma said: "We'd like to thank everyone who has agreed to help so far and ask others who feel they can help - whether through donating money or raffle prizes or by giving their time to help ensure the event

"Any help is so much appreciated and every little goes a long way to reaching our target."
Family friend Lois Maguire added:

"It has been so lovely already how much the Stourport community has

come together, donating their time, unwanted gifts and more.

Concerns over new incinerator

A COUNCILLOR has hit out at the building of an incinerator on Stourport Road in Kidderminster.

Coun Vicky Caulfield, who represents the Green Party in Blakebrook and Habberley South, expressed concerns amidst work starting on the access road to the site and vegetation being cut back. Power Generation Midlands

Power Generation Midlands (PGM) was granted planning permission by Worcestershire County Council back in 2021 for an 'energy and resource park' on land next to Liberty Aluminium foundry off Stourport Road.

On its website, PGM claims the energy centre would take around 75,000tonnes-a-year of commercial and industrial waste left after recycling from the local area.

The waste would be used as a fuel to generate low carbon

electricity and heat which could be used to power local businesses including the nextdoor Liberty Aluminium foundry. Some of the electricity and heat would also be used to power the Plastics Recovery Plant.

PGM also claims it could

PGM also claims it could enable the foundry to expand, creating 100 jobs at the plant and during the construction process.

Coun Caulfield said - after long periods of inaction and towards the end of the threeyear expiration date of the planning permission - she was angry work had now started.

"Waste incineration facilities bring traffic, smell, noise

and air pollution.
"The air pollution includes particulates and dioxins which stay in the soil and food chain and can even cause genetic harm to humans and wildlife in future generations."
She questioned how envi-

She questioned how environmentally friendly the scheme was, saying burning materials and increasing CO2 would add to global warming. And she questioned whether the incinerator project will ever be completed as some - in other parts of the country - had been cancelled midbuild,

She said the country needed to produce less waste and focus more on renewable forms of energy, with a strong emphasis of source-separated recycling and composting.

ossing. "What's needed is a policy of 'zero waste' plus a 'circular economy' where materials circulate at their highest value for as long as possible, for example through repair and reuse.

"After that, there can be higher resource recovery rates through a strong emphasis on source-separated recycling and composting. "Instead, incineration is a

"Instead, incineration is a linear process where materials are lost forever, and the ash remains are hazardous waste."

The Standard contacted Power Generation Midlands for a response but it has declined to comment at this time.

The Droitwich Barge Canal was built to carry salt from Droitwich down to the Severn and was com-pleted in 1771. The Junction Canal was constructed in 1853/4 to try to revive the canal trade which had been eroded by the development Both canals were of the railways. abandoned in 1939.

A campaign to restore the canals was initiated by the late Max Sinclair in the late 1960s and soon the Droitwich Canal Trust was formed. In 1973 work began on restoring the canals

In 2001, as part of the trust's fund-raising campaign, annual summer water festivals in Vines Park were arranged on the already restored canal in Vines Park, and in There will be plenty of activities to suit all tastes at the St Richard's Canal Festival over the May bank holiday weekend. s

2006 there was also a revival of the celebration of St Richard's Day with

a well dressing. From 2008, the two events were

Saturday in May.

The canals were fully restored in 2011 (all the way from Hanbury Wharf down to the River Severn).
In 2013 the festival was extended

to become St Richard's Festival extending over the whole weekend with events in the town centre as well as in Vines Park.

Over the years that followed, Wychayon District Council became one of the main organisers of the event with more and more input from, amongst others, the Worcester to Birmingham and Droitwich Canals Society.

In 2016 a decision was made by the council to re-focus the festival back into Vines Park for 2017 and to step back from its involvement. The Worcester to Birmingham and Droitwich Canals Society successfully took it over as the main organisers with help from the district and town councils and others

The charity's three aircraft each carry a crew comprising a pilot, two paramedics or flight doctors plus full life-support medical equip-

The fleet of critical care cars each have critical care paramedics on-board with full life-support medical equipment.

Each year it costs £16million just to keep the three charity helicop-ters and fleet of critical care cars operational.

Fire service delivers life-saving equipment to Ukraine frontline

WORCESTERSHIRE's fire and rescue service has joined a convov of national colleagues to deliver thousands of pieces of

life-saving firefighting equipment to Ukrainian firefighters.
Hereford and Worcester Fire and Rescue Service (HWFRS) is supporting the convoy which includes 30 vehicles, including 26 fire engines and various equipment. such as hoses, PPE, road traffic collision equipment and more.

A total of 18 fire and rescue serv A total of 1s fire and rescue services from across the UK are participating in the convoy, organised by FIRE AID, National Resilience and International Search and Rescue, HM Government, National Fire Chiefs Council (NFCC) and the Fire Industry Association (FIA).

The convoy, which is the eighth and largest of its kind, is sponsored by the UK government. It will add to the 119 fire and rescue vehicles and 200,000 pieces of firefighting equipment already donated since

the invasion began.

HWFRS Area Commander Lee
Watson said: "HWFRS has been part
of multiple convoys in an effort to

of multiple convoys in an effort to support our Ukrainian colleagues. "Ukrainian firefighters display incredible bravery daily, risking their lives to protect their commu-nities despite limited resources and

immense danger.
"We recognise the ongoing challenge and are privileged to be able to support their efforts.

"I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Fire Authority



for supporting these donations, all the staff that have made this pos-sible and the volunteers who have selflessly given up their own time to participate in the delivery of this

essential equipment."

The war in Ukraine has had a devastating impact on Ukrainian firefighters.

The latest figures from the State Emergency Services of Ukraine show, since the start of the full-scale invasion in 2022, 100 firefighters have been killed and a further 431 injured, while four are currently in captivity and one is missing.

Meanwhile, 411 firehouses and 1,700 fire vehicles have been destroyed and 95 firehouses are now in occupied territories.

Despite these challenges, Ukrainian firefighters continue to operate in the war zone to save lives and protect property, often at great personal risk.

About 100 volunteers, drawn

from fire and rescue services and FIRE AID, are participating in the

A DIGITAL campaign to help keep antibiotics working for all and tackle the threat of antibiotic

resistance has been launched.
The UK Health Security Agency
(UKHSA) has introduced 'Andi Biotic' who is set to embark on a six-week long mission to answer people's uncertainties about when and how to take antibiotics to help preserve their effectiveness for us today and future generations.

Andi is said to come to the rescue in a variety of scenarios to make sure people are taking antibiotics in the right way, including not taking them for colds and flu, only taking antibiotics when the have been prescribed and not saving antibiotics for future use.

Antibiotic resistance is a major public health threat, and new research by UKHSA highlights that almost half of the UK population are concerned about how the issue offects there according

affects them personally.
Yet, over half are either unsure if there is anything they can individually do to prevent antibiotics becoming less effective at treating infections or incorrectly believe there's nothing they can personally

Dispelling myths

Aiming to bust these misconceptions among young adults aged 18 to 34, the digital campaign will be led by a new comedic mascot char-



acter, Andi Biotic.
Andi was developed by UKHSA to take the success of the Keep Antibiotics Working Campaign from 2018 to a new generation.

This first stage is a pilot which will test the potential to capture people's attention and imagination through digital channels

UKHSA regional deputy director – West Midlands, Katie Spence, said: "Antibiotic resistance is one of the biggest global health threats that exists

"Each time antibiotics are not used correctly, it increases the chance that microbes will evolved to resist the medicine designed to kill them, leading to more and more

resistant strains of infections, aka 'super bugs', that become increasingly harder to treat.

"This puts you and your family

at risk of more severe or longer illness, and means in the future, antibiotics might not work when

wou really need them.

"That's why we're asking everyone in the West Midlands to support us in the fight against AMR (antimicrobial resistance), by doing a few very simple things."

The campaign launched on UKHSA's social media channels and will be at participating GP surgeries and pharmacies throughout April and May

Prof Dame Jenny Harries, Chief Executive of UKHSA, said: "Antibiotic resistance is impacting people every day in this country and is one of the biggest threats to our future health. But we can all help tackle the problem. Everyone, especially young people, has the power to help change this by fol-lowing simple steps to take antibi-otics correctly and only when they have been prescribed by a health-care professional.

"This isn't just for our own health it's about helping protect everyone in our communities and future generations.

Antibiotic-resistant bacteria of any kind are less likely to respond to some treatments, which can cause serious complications, including bloodstream infections, sepsis and hospitalisation.

However, a second-half double from Maz Kouhyar against his former club put Harriers in command, before Morgan-Smith grabbed his second and Kidderminster's fifth at the death. Kidderminster remain top

the National League North table on 89 points, joint with Brackley Town, but ahead of their title rivals by a superior goal difference of plus 22.

sell-out season-high

attendance of 5,341 watched on at Aggborough as Kidderminster completed a double over their Edgar Street rivals and secured a 11th win

in 13 unbeaten games.

No sooner had the Harriers supporters taken their seats they were back on their feet when Worrall curled home a glorious shot after just 95 seconds to send Aggborough

Morgan-Smith then doubled Harriers lead on 18 minutes after linking up superbly with Ashley Hemmings.

The move started deep in

the home half with a throw-in to Hereford which the visitors cleared up to Hemmings. He flicked the ball on to Morgan-Smith who played a one-two with Hemmings. Morgan-Smith ploughed forwards and dispatched a firm shot past advancing Hereford goalkeeper Theo Richardson to get the Harriers supporters celebrating again.

Reece Devine then whipped a low ball across the Hereford goal and Zak Brown forced a save with the visitors unable to clear their lines.

Hereford responded after winning a free-kick on the right which Sterling-James

brilliantly dispatched home from fully 35 yards to ignite a huge roar from the 1,083 travelling Bulls supporters in the South Stand.

As the interval approached Matt Preston headed wide at the back post from a free-kick for Hereford and Hemmings shot over the bar

for Kidderminster. The Reds went 3-1 ahead early in the second-half when Maz Kouhyar finished off a sweeping move with aplomb in front of an ecstatic North Stand to put Harriers further in front.

Kouhyar struck again 10 minutes later to make it 4-1 with a header at the back post from a deep cross after numerous stoppages, substi-

tutions and yellow cards.

On the hour mark the flood-lights came on ahead of a heavy downpour which left the pitch sodden for the remainder of the game.
