

# VE Day 80

### IN THE WYRE FOREST



A VARIETY of activities and events are taking place across Kidderminster, Stourport and Bewdley for VE Day 80.

### KIDDERMINSTER

An Evening of Remembrance, Tribute and Community Spirit will take place at St Mary and All Saints Church, Churchfields, Kidderminster, from 6.30pm to 9.30pm on Thursday, May 8.

A number of events will take place during the three-hour commemoration, including bell-ringing by St Mary's Society of Changeringers and Friends, a performance by St Catherine's CE Primary School Choir, Wartime tunes from The Jukebox Jems, Bagpipes by Craig Swarbrick - The Celtic Piper and readings by the Deputy Lieutenant Mr West, The Venerable Hayward Osborne and the WFDC Armed Forces Champion, Coun Kevin Gale.

Other events will include a parade featuring ex-service groups and cadets, a Town Crier proclamation from Stephen Day and a tribute reading and beacon lighting by the Mayor of Kidderminster, Coun George Connolly. Bugle by Heidi Worth.



### **STOURPORT**

Stourport Town Council has organised commemorations from 9am on Thursday, May 8.

It will begin at 9am 8 with the Town Crier reading a proclamation for peace at the War Memorial Gardens on Vale Road. As the proclamation is read out the Mayor of Stourport will raise the 'Flag of Peace' - both will be streamed live on the Stourport Town Council Facebook page.

From 3.30pm, Eat Street Repeat will bring a food court to War Memorial Park on Lickhill Road with a host of yendors.

Among the entertainment will be DJ Stretch who will be joined in the lead up to the beacon lighting ceremony by The Swingettes and more. There will also be a number of military vehicles on display.

From 4pm to 4.45pm, people can join local historian and expert Geoff Shaw, in Stourport Community Centre, for a free talk on Stourport's contribution to VE Day and its role in the Second World War.

And from 6.30pm to 8.30pm, the bell ringers of the Parish Church of St Bartholomew (Areley Kings) will be joining in with 'Together We Chime – Let the Nation's Bells Ring Loud'. Part of this will also be broadcast by Stourport Town Council for those gathered in War Memorial Park.

The Beacon Lighting Ceremony will take place from 9.15pm to 9.30pm and it will start with a welcome by Rev Carey Saleh. It will culminate with the Stourport Carnival Queen lighting the 'Lamp of Peace' at 9.30pm.

### **BEWDLEY**

Bewdley's VE Day 80 commemorations run from 8.45pm to 9.30pm.

A short outdoor service outside St Anne's Church on Load Street will commemorate Victory in Europe.

The event will conclude with a beacon lighting.

# Bat house is hit by vandals

### **HEARTLESS** vandals have damaged a bat house at **Hurcott Pools and Wood.**

The site in between Kidderminster and Blakedown is between a site of specific scientific interest for its wetland habitats, in

particular, the wet woodland.

The bat house was constructed during 2019 with the help of the Worcestershire Bat Group using materials from a disused boathouse.

During the attack on the habitat, the bat house had its tiles from all sides of its roof ripped

off and smashed.

Repairs to the house are planned for next week to make the building safe again for the


Doors were sealed, special bat entrances were added, and roosting spots were built inside.

A spokesperson for Wyre

A spokesperson for Wyre Forest District Council which revealed the news on Wednesday said: "It's an important place for bats, especially as their natural homes are becoming harder to find.
"Vandalism like this damages

wildlife habitats and wastes time and money."

They urged anyone who saw any anti-social behaviour at the area's nature reserves to call police on 101 or by reporting it via the westmercia.police.uk website.



And they concluded by saying: "Let's respect and protect our local nature together.

### **Bat conservation**

Figures from the Worcestershire Wildlife Trust and Bat Conservation Trust show the county is home to 14 of the 18 bat species found in

Among the most popular are

the common pipistrelle, soprano pipistrelle and brown long-eared bat. The county also has records of several other species, including some that are rare or uncommon, such as Bechstein's bat.

Daubenton's, Leisler's Natterer's, and Whiskered bats are considered rare in Worcestershire although sightings have been recorded in the

Worcestershire is working to

protect and conserve bat populations, including converting structures into bat hotels like the one at Hurcott Pools and Wood, and conducting surveys to assess the impact of development on bat roosts.

Earlier this year, Wyre Forest District Council received funding from the Natural Networks to install 20 nest and bat boxes around the woodland.



## Shocked by theft of defibrillator

AN APPEAL has been launched by Jelleyman's Heritage Arts Charity after the suspected theft of a vital life-saving defibrillator from premises on April 19

The device, donated by the British Heart Foundation, was a much-needed community asset and was stored in a heated external box to ensure it was accessible to the public at all times.

The theft has shocked and saddened members of the charity and the local com-munity who could rely on the availability of this life-saving

equipment. Liz Gardiner, CEO of Severn Liz Gardiner, CEO of Severn Valley Training, which led the campaign to get the defibrilator installed at Jelleyman's Mill, said, "We are devastated by this selfish act.

"This defibrillator was not

just for Jelleyman's - it was for the entire community.

"It was there to save lives "Stealing it puts people's lives at risk, and I urge anyone with information to come for-



ward." The defibrillator was installed to provide immediate assistance to anyone in the area experiencing a car-diac arrest. Quick access to a defibrillator can significantly increase a person's chances of survival.

# Extra funding to boost police

**MULTI-MILLION** pound funding boost will allow West Mercia Police to hire dozens of new officers into neighhourhood roles over the next year.

Government funding of \$3million will cover the hiring of 31 neighbourhood police officers as well as 20 PCSOs and 15 specials across West Mercia.

Earlier this month, Home Secretary Yvette Cooper announced details of funding for 2025/26 as the start of a four-year Neighbourhood Policing Guarantee programme to bring in 13,000 extra officers by the end of Labour's Parliament.

Each force in England and Wales has been allocated a budget based on the Police Funding Formula with West Mercia Police receiving £3,108,283, in line with neighbouring Staffordshire's allocation of £3,014,459.

Speaking on behalf of West

Mercia Police Federation, Steve Butler, said: "We welcome the Government's plans to boost neighbourhood policing, an area that was severely hit by the budget cuts introduced from 2010, with the links into our communities being hard hit and public confidence in policing being dented.

"It is vital we rebuild neighbourhood policing and this investment should help get us back on track by putting officers back into the hearts of our communities."

As part of the Government's plans, it wants every neigh-

bourhood in England and Wales to have dedicated teams spending their time dedicated on the beat, with guaranteed police patrols in town centres and other hotspot areas at peak times such as Friday and Saturday nights

In announcing the funding, Ms Cooper said: "The heartbeat of our Great British policing tradition is seeing Bobbies on the beat, but for too long, too many communities have been feeling aban-doned as crime soared and neighbourhood police disap-

peared. "That's why Government is determined to get police back on the beat and into our town centres.

"It should not matter where you live - everyone deserves local, visible policing they can trust."

# Calls for more to be done to combat ambulance staff abuse

AMBULANCE staff across
the Midlands are subjected
to around nine incidents of
physical abuse, verbal abuse
or aggression every day prompting a new awareness
campaign.

Ambulance

West Midlands Ambulance Service (WMAS) has launched the 'How We Treat Each Other Matters' campaign to encourage members of the public to be respectful to ambulance staff.

Staff from WMAS' frontline, control rooms and Patient Transport Services are coming together on social media to encourage respect and safety for all staff.

The campaign launches as the number of violent incidents against UK ambulance staff reached an all-time high in the last 12 months.

### A nationwide issue

Across the UK's 14 ambulance services, 22,536 cases were recorded - up 15 per cent on the previous year - 3,370 of which were in the West Midlands.

The WMAS Trust said it did not tolerate abuse and violence directed towards its workforce, with legal action always being pursued.

action always being pursued.
Chief Executive Officer Anthony
Marsh said: "For many staff, this



sort of abuse can have a profound impact on their lives with some staff never recovering and actually leaving the service altogether.

"While it is a minority of people who commit these offences, we need the public to support us to make such abuse something that is unacceptable."

WMAS Head of Security and

WMAS Head of Security and Safety Dan Knight added: "Everyone deserves to come to work without fear of abuse, aggression or violence from the public - whether that be our staff on the frontline, Patient Transport Services staff or those who work in our control rooms.

"The message is simple, abuse will not be tolerated and appropriate actions will be taken when these incidents occur - 3,370 incidents of abuse and violence is 3,370 too many.

"We hope with the launch of this campaign, it will be an important reminder to the public that showing respect to our staff, who are ultimately only trying to help people, should be a given."

### 'Shocking figures'

Following the release of the new figures, Chair of the Association of Ambulance Chief Executives (AACE), Jason Killens, has written to ministers responsible for ambulance services in the UK to explore what further national policy

interventions can be developed to help combat the growing number of violent assaults against ambulance workers in the UK. He said: "These figures are truly

He said: "These figures are truly shocking and reflect a pattern of increased violence, aggression and abuse directed at hard-working ambulance people who are there to help people in their times of greatest need."

est need.
"Frontline staff as well as call handlers are affected by this horrendous abuse and this unacceptable behaviour has a major long-term impact on the health and wellbeing of ambulance people who are simply trying to do their jobs and help save lives.

and help save lives.
"This situation is now so serious that we are seeking to engage with UK health ministers at the highest level to explore new interventions that could help deter potential perpetrators of these attacks.

petrators of these attacks. "We would also underline again that it is vital that the judiciary uses all available legislation to ensure appropriate sentences are handed out consistently to those found guilty of committing these horrific crimes against our workforce."

# **Bringing scent and butterflies**

MAY sees the start of the garden show season – RHS Chelsea gets the ball rolling with its fabulous show gardens that not only inspire but can also create green fingered envy at the same time.

Your garden or outside space may not be up for a gold medal, but that doesn't mean that it's not a 'show stopper' in its own right. Just think of the time you spend feeling good in the space you have created – and that can be as simple as a single pot of lavender on a patio to bring fragrance, beauty and butterflies to your special place.

Lavender loves container life (and being in borders as well) and is also often planted as an edging plant with roses or grown as an informal

It's a favourite with gardeners not just for its beautiful form and fra-grance but also because it attracts

essential pollinators.

It's also considered a romantic flower that most gardeners get the urge to plant in their garden sooner or later and can add real value with its scent and shades of purple flow-

its scent and snades of purple flow-ers and silver leaf backdrop.

To successfully grow lavender, it needs to be planted from March to May in a warm, well-drained soil with full sun. It's a tough plant though and once established only requires regular pruning after flow-

ering has finished in the Autumn.
English lavender, Lavandula
angustifolia, is hardier and lives
longer than French and Spanish lavender. Two of the most popular varieties of English lavender



are 'Munstead', an old-fashioned standard height plant with blue-purple flowers and 'Hidcote,' much loved for its dark purple

Part of the same plant family as lavender is the sun-loving Mediterranean herb oregano. Easy to grow, compact and drought tolerant, it thrives in pots or in the ground and forms a low clump of small aromatic leaves that has attractive small pink or white flowers in summer. It's a peren-Howers in summer. It's a peren-nial, living for many years, and is usually hardy enough to survive the British winter if grown in a warm sunny spot, in a container or in free-draining soil. It is used mainly as a culinary herb, but also makes a great herbal tea – just pick a spring of fresh oregano, let it infuse in boiling water for a few minutes and sweeten with some honey if the taste is too bitter for you. Oregano tea is often enjoyed for its potential health benefits, including its antimicro-bial and antioxidant properties. It is believed to support digestion, boost the immune system, and provide relief from respiratory

Herbs are always a good addition to any garden or patio, but for anyone with a lawn, don't forget that it's No Mow May ... so time to let the lawn grow long and let pollinators feed on the flowers

Which gives you time to tackle some of the other jobs in the garden ...and top tips for the month from the RHS include:

- Watch out for late frosts and
- protect tender plants

  Earth up potatoes and plant
- any still remaining

  After all risk of frost has passed, plant out tomatoes,
- courgettes and pumpkins

  Plant out summer bedding
  plants at the end of the month, veather permitting
- Water early and late to get the most out of your water,recycle water if possible

  Open greenhouse vents and
- doors on warm days

  Mow lawns but consider leaving some areas uncut for wild-life, or mow less often so flow-

## The Royal Family took part in the celebrations



The British Royal Family also played a central role in London's victory celebrations.

Huge numbers of people surged down The Mall to Buckingham Palace, where King George VI, Oueen Elizabeth and their daughters, Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret, soon appeared on the balcony to wave to the cheering crowds. In total, the King and Queen made eight appearances on the balcony, and at one point were joined by Winston Churchill. While the King and Queen were waving to the crowds for the last time that evening, their daughters were secretly mingling with the jubilant crowds below them. The future monarch, Princess Elizabeth, and her sister Margaret had been allowed to leave the palace and take part - anonymously - in the party-like atmosphere. Princess Elizabeth later recalled, 'We stood outside and shouted, "We want the King"... I think it was one of the most memorable nights of my life." King George VI, like Churchill, also gave a radio address. In it, he praised his subjects' endurance and called for a lasting peace. He also paid tribute to those who could not join in the celebrations, saying: 'Let us remember those who will not come back...let us remember the men in all the services. and the women in all the services, who have laid down their lives. We have com to the end of our tribulation and they are not with us at the moment of our rejoicing.
