## 'We'll make town's markets great again

THE NEW operator Kidderminster Markets has vowed to return them to their former glory after being handed the contract to take it over from next month.

Bescot Promotions Ltd, run by brothers Scott and Spencer Evans, was awarded the contract by Kidderminster Town Council after a competitive tender process found it to be the preferred option.

Scott told the Standard: "We are a family-run company which has been operating for more than 30 years and me and Spencer have been part of it for more than 20.

"It is a kind of home-coming for us

as we used to help run Kidderminster Market when we first started out.

"Right now, it's not as big as it used to be - it was a larger market with more stalls and we want to get it back to how it was.

# The Flying Scotsman on schedule to come steaming in

THE WORLD famous 'Flying Scotsman' will haul the first passenger train along the length of the 16-mile Severn Valley Railway when it fully re-opens.

Locomotive 60103 will undertake the journey when the northernmost section is reunited with the rest of the line on July 25.

The serious embankment collapse at the end of January saw the isolation of the SVR's northern terminus at Bridgnorth.

at Bridgnorth.

The 'Flying Scotsman' will head up the first service of the day from Kidderminster, crossing the repaired section of the embankment

at Mor Brook bridge and arriving to a triumphant and long-awaited welcome at Bridgnorth station.

The historic and much-loved locomotive will haul three return trips a day on the Friday, July 25, and again on the Saturday and Sunday July 26 and 27, as part of the SVR's Swingin' Sixties event which celebrates the 60th anniversary of the line in preservation.

Jonathan 'Gus' Dunster, the SVR's managing director, said: "What a coup this is.

"Opportunities to travel behind this iconic loco on a heritage line are rare. It is incredibly exciting to have the best-known locomotive in the world at the head of our first full-line service this season."

full-line service this season."
He thanked the National Railway
Museum for agreeing to the visit
and and Northern Steam Operations
Limited and DB Cargo for their
assistance.

"We'll be pairing 'Flying Scotsman with the SVR's set of Gresley teak carriages to make sure we celebrate both the SVR's 60th anniversary and the reuniting of our full line in the most stunning way possible."

Craig Bentley, National Railway Museum director, said: "We are delighted to make this visit from the world's most famous steam locomotive possible and to help Severn Valley Railway mark an important moment in its recovery."

Tickets for a return trip behind 60103 'Flying Scotsman' are \$45 and must be pre-booked.

Tickets booked for the Saturday and Sunday also allow unlimited travel on all other Swingin' Sixties services for the rest of the day.

Tickets to attend the Swingin' Sixties event without travel behind 'Flying Scotsman' are bookable now, and all passengers will get plenty of opportunity to see the iconic visitor in action.

When the 60103 locomotive last visited the SVR in 2016 after restoration, it was a sell-out success and bosses are expecting a similar high demand for tickets.

## Embankment work on course to reconnect line

THE PROGRESS on repairs to the Severn Valley Railway's (SVR) embankment which suffered a landslip is gaining momentum and progressing well

Specialist engineering contractor CML took over the site at the beginning of the month and has already excavated more than 2,500tonnes of material from the track formation and embankment. It has also completed temporary culverting works on the watercourse below the bridge to facilitate full access to the embankment for plant and machinery.

This will allow further excava-

This will allow further excavation to take place around the collapsed wing wall of the bridge and then the next stage will see

and then the next stage will see a concrete footing installed.

CML will carefully lift in more than 100 huge Legato concrete blocks, each weighing around 2.5tonnes, onto this to form a solid structure.

The blocks are already on site, ready for

Next, CML will backfill the embankment structure, using alternate layers of geogrid matting and imported aggregate, to tie the new wall into the embankment.

Large L-shaped concrete units will then be placed across the top of the bridge to form a strong base to carry the track bed, ready for the reinstatement of the rail itself

ready for the reinstatement of the rail itself.
The SVR's project manager Antony
Bartlam said: "It really is a very clever solution indeed and CML's progress is impressive, helped by the recent good weather."
CML contracts manager, Stuart Hale,

said: "This really is something different, not just a run-of-the-mill embankment failure."

A robust and permanent solution which could be built at speed, be affordable for the heritage line and comply with the local authority's watercourse mitigation measures was needed.

"We're very glad to now be at the 'bootson-the-ground' stage and looking forward to getting this finished, hopefully with no undue problems."

The SVR's managing director, Jonathan 'Gus' Dunster added it was satisfying to see real progress now being made after frustrating - but necessary - delays. Gus added: "As soon as the embank-

Gus added: "As soon as the embankment failure happened at the end of January, we saw a tremendous groundswell of support from the public. "Thousands of people have donated,

"Thousands of people have donated, and together with money from our insurance company, this has meant we could go ahead with this essential repair work to re-unite the whole length of the line."

# £3million plan for Brinton Park to bring new pavilion and more

WORK has started on a &3million plan to improve Kidderminster's Brinton

The project, which is funded by \$2.4 million from the National Lottery Heritage Fund and \$460,000 from Wyre Forest District Council's Evergreen Fund, will enhance facilities, protect local wildlife, and celebrate the park's rich heritage.

ebrate the park's rich heritage.
The Sons of Rest Pavilion is a key
part of the project. Due to serious
structural problems, the building

will need to be demolished and rebuilt.

The new building will reflect the historic character of the original pavilion while offering improved community facilities including a new cafe space, terrace, ornamental pond and landscaping.

Work has now started on the construction of an artificial badger sett, which will relocate badgers already living in the park, a factor that has caused delays to the project. This will allow work on the Sons of Rest

will allow work on the Sons of Rest Pavilion to begin in the Summer. Coun Tracey Onslow, Wyre Forest District Council's Cabinet Member for Culture, Leisure, Arts and Community Safety said: "It is great to see that work is already underway at Brinton Park.

"This first stage is vital work which needs to be completed to both protect local wildlife and allow us to move ahead with the main improvements in the park."

The volunteer, who has been a
member of the Public and Patient
Forum at the Trust since November 2023, has been recognised for her outstanding work to improve deaf outstanding work to improve deal awareness at the county's hospitals, as well as her valuable work with several other organisations and charities, over the last 15 years.

Her continued work at the Trust helps to ensure the needs

Trust helps to ensure the needs hearing-impaired patients, staff and volunteers at the Alexandra, Kidderminster and Worcestershire Royal Hospitals are met, as well as helping the Trust to meet the requirements of the Accessible Information Standard.

Merleen also works as a peer support volunteer at Hearing Link and as a speaker for Hearing Dogs alongside her 'outstanding and brilliant' pooches - previously Grace

and now Zyla.

Since 2011 they have given and been involved in over 550 talks and activities, raised more than \$90,000 and spread the word about

Hearing Dogs and Hearing Link to more than 15,000 people. Between them, Grace and Zyla have encouraged the sponsorship of over 110 puppies, each trained to enable their recipient to be the very best version of themselves that

Merleen also remains committed to maintaining her links Wychavon District Council, thwatch Worcestershire. Healthwatch Gloucestershire Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, and Sensory Matters to directly support hearing impairment and British Sign Language service users and clients. She also supports Silverstone F1 Circuit and Museum to better support hearing impaired staff and visitors, and continue to challenge non-compliance of the Equality Act 2010 for reasonable adjust-ments for all those with hearing impairment and access issues for sistance Dogs.

Merleen, who started volunteering following early retirement when her own deteriorating hearing impairment proved too challenging in her work as a senior education officer, work as a senior education officer, said she was stunned when the letter informing her of her honour dropped through the letterbox.

She added: "I have only been



able to raise awareness, challenge and hold people or organisations to account because of all the folk o including my husband Paul, my audiologist Tom Dixon, and the colleagues across the organisations I work with - who have encouraged, shared, challenged, supported, and helped me over the years. To all of you, a heartfelt thank you - this recognition is for all of you as well.

"There is still so much to do, particularly in the promotion of assistive technology to enhance communication in everyday situations; to encourage hearing-impaired people to get support for their hearing loss to avoid devastating health issues in later life; and encourage everyone who has a hearing aid to wear it to enable them to reconnect with

## Chewsing to clean streets

FOREST District Council has been awarded a

Council has been awarded a \$27,500 grant to tackle the sticky issue of chewing gum blighting local streets.

The cash has come from the Chewing Gum Task Force, which is administered by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy.

The council is one of 52 across the country which successfully applied

country which successfully applied for funds to clean gum off pavements and prevent future littering.
Established by Defra (Department

for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs) and run by environmen-Affairs) and run by environment tal charity Keep Britain Tidy, the Chewing Gum Task Force Grant Scheme is open to councils across the UK wishing to clean up gum in their local areas and invest in longterm behaviour change to prevent gum from being dropped in the first

The task force is funded by major gum manufacturers including Mars Wrigley and Perfetti Van Melle, with

an investment of up to \$10million spread over five years.

Monitoring and evaluation carried out by Behaviour Change – a not-forprofit social enterprise - has shown areas which received funding in the first and second years of the scheme saw gum littering reduce by up to 80 per cent in the first two months. Further reductions were observed six months after targeted street cleaning and the installation off specially

designed signs encouraging people to 'bin their gum'.
Coun Ben Brookes, Wyre Forest

District Council's Cabinet Member for Operational Services, said: "We're really pleased to have been awarded this funding – nobody likes seeing

gum stuck all over our streets.
"This grant means we can get to work cleaning it up and, just as importantly, help remind people to bin their gum rather than drop it.

"It's a small change in behaviour

that makes a big difference to how

our district looks and feels."
Estimates suggest the annual clean-up of chewing gum costs councils across the UK around £7million and, according to Keep Britain Tidy, around 77 per cent of England's streets and 99 per cent of retail sites are stained with gum.

are stained with gum.

In its third year the Task Force awarded 54 councils grants worth a total of £1.585 million, helping clean an estimated 500,000m2 of pavements.

Allison Ogden-Newton OBE, Keep Allson Oggen-Newton UBE, Reep Britain Tidy's chief executive, said: "Chewing gum continues to be an unsightly form of litter in our pub-lic spaces – though thankfully the scheme is leading to significant reductions.

"People need to remember that disposing irresponsibly of their gum causes harm to our environment as it takes years to decompose naturally - and, ultimately, costs the public purse to clean it up.

"One of the ways we do this is by providing them with frozen enrichment.

"The frozen treats not only provide the animals with cool relief but also stimulate their brains as they have to work out how to get to the suspended delights inside. Just like with us humans, they always go down a treat.'

#### Staying trim during the summer

WITH THE summer months upon us, Worcestershire's grass cutting programme

wordestershire s grass cutting programme is now under way.
Worcestershire County Council's team has 5,000km of grass to trim.
There are 6million metres squared of rural verges and over 320,000metres squared of

central reservations along its roads.

The cutting regime helps to keep roads visible for motorists but also provides a safe space for wildlife too.

Worcestershire County Council cuts less grass to make areas more friendly and pro-tected for pollinators, however some cutting

is still necessary.

At Junctions where visibility is required, grass is cut back to the full extent, whereas parallel to the road, grass will only be cut back one or two metres, leaving significant uncut areas available for wildlife.

Coun Karl Perks, Worcestershire County Council's Cabinet Member with Responsibility for Highways and Transport, said: "Although our main priority when cutting roadside verges is to ensure the safety of road users, it's important we can also support the county's pollinator popula-

"During the summer months, the roadsides grow very quickly, and we have a statutory duty to maintain them and to make sure the road network is safe

"However, the changes implemented in recent years have seen significant improvement to biodiversity opportunities on our

Worcestershire County Council prides itself on being pollinator friendly and actively works to promote the protection of pol-linating insects and their habitat.

Dual carriageway verges offer important near networks for pollinators, known as Ree Lines'

Reduced cutting of the central reservations has now created connections between previously isolated areas of ecological inter-

There are 46 Roadside Verge Nature Reserves designated for rare or special species and habitats across the county and all sites now receive a bespoke approach to ensure protected or rare species are fully considered when it comes to maintenance.

## More drug users sticking to their rehab programmes

TREATMENT gramme for drug users in Worcestershire has seen more than double the number of former offenders continue their treatment when they have left prison.

Many people who find themselves in that situation receive treatment while they are serving time but struggle to stick to their programme when they are released

The Continuity of Care programme aims to stop this happening by sup-porting individuals to continue with this structured treatment so, when they are released, they still actively taking part in the programme back in the community.

The Safer Worcestershire Partnership, which runs the scheme, includes Public Health in Worcestershire and Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion.

It has been successful in using funding from both the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) and the Office for Health Improvement and Disparities (OHID) to support drug and alcohol treatment provider, Cranstoun.

Forming relationships



The support workers build up relationships with drug takers during their time in prison, creating bonds which lead to positive behav-

Once individuals leave prison, these relationships continue in the community meaning the treatment is more likely to continue.

This turnaround in former offenders continuing with their treatment programme has been recognised by Public Health leaders in Worcestershire.

Worcestershire County Councillor Karen May, Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing said: "The number of people continuing with their treatment is normally quite poor but in Worcestershire, we've seen a rise to 51 per cent.

"This is a massive improvement,

more than double in just a few short

months."

Matt Burke, Cranstoun's county
manager, who is commissioned to
provide the on-the-ground support
acknowledged this success.

He said: "This is great news. We
know we're making a difference to
people's lives when they come out
of prison, how much this positively
invested on the local community." impacts on the local community.

"Seeing these figures proves it all

the more."
West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion added, as the senior officer responsible for the Combatting Drugs Partnerships he was pleased to be working with partners to tackle drug use.

"It's important drug users, who have often been involved in other crimes, continue to receive support to integrate back into society and prevent them from committing fur-ther offences and causing harm to communities.
"I hope that, through the Safer

Worcestershire project, we are able to continue seeing an increase in the number of people using the programme.

WEST Mercia Police has announced plans to make staff cuts to save cash

The force and its police and crime commissioner (PCC) said they 'had to make significant savings and improve efficiencies' in a statement

released last week.

While police officer numbers are not set to be affect-ed, other staff will be asked if they want to reduce their working hours or take voluntary resignation.

A statement from Chief

A statement from Chief Constable Richard Cooper and Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion said: "We believe these measures, along with a police-staff recruitment freeze, will help stabilise our finencial position."

financial position."

The statement added they had already made some redundancies in non-police officer roles, helping 'achieve crucial savings' with 'further

crucial savings with further reductions necessary'.

To support this, West Mercia Police is introducing two voluntary schemes to minimise the need for further computations of the programment of the progr compulsory redundancies

The two schemes are a voluntary and temporary reduction in hours scheme, and a Mutually Agreed Resignation Scheme (MARS) allowing staff of either organisation to voluntarily resign with a lump sum payment.

Neither organisation shared details of how many positions would be affected or how much money they needed to save.



## Rail Hub is still on track

THE MIDLANDS Rail Hub is a step closer to reality after receiving confirmation of financial backing in the Chancellor's recent spending review.

Chancellor Rachel Reeves, delivering her Comprehensive Spending

ering her Comprehensive Spending Review, announced she was funding the rail upgrade which will benefit thousands across the region. Speaking at the dispatch box, Ms Reeves said: "I am providing fund-ing for the Midlands Rail Hub, the region's biggest and most ambitious rail imprograment scheme for genrail improvement scheme for gen-erations, strengthening connections from Birmingham across the West Midlands and into Wales too."

Midlands Rail Hub is a £1.75 billion blueprint for faster, better and more frequent connections across the region.

Richard Parker, Mayor of the West Midlands, said: "The Midlands Rail Hub is about more than trains it's about opportunity.

"This investment will unlock thou-

sands of jobs, support new homes and connect our region to faster, greener growth.

"It's a major step forward for national connectivity and local prosperity, and a clear signal that the Midlands is at the heart of Britain's

future."

#### Work begins on revamping gateway site

WORK started this week to transform Worcester's Shrub Hill Quarter, marking a major milestone for the county.

Demolition work is being undertaken to reshape the gateway into a modern, vibrant destination. The outdated blue corrugated unit and brick tower on the Shrub Hill Industrial Estate is being removed.

This work, supported by the government's Brownfield Land Release Fund, paves the way for a dynamic new district, delivering much-needed homes, public spaces, and new jobs.

Coun Alan Amos, Worcestershire County Council's cabinet member for business and skills, said: "This is more than just clearing old buildings, it's about unlocking a once-in-a-generation opportunity to create something extraordinary for Worcester.
"Shrub Hill Quarter will become a place where people want to live, work, and spend time.
"This next step brings us closer to a bold new future for the city."

The demolition and site clearance will take up to

eight weeks.
For safety, temporary closures of the nearby footpath and parts of the road network will be in place.

This includes a closure of the path from the main entrance of Shrub Hill Industrial Estate to the pedestrian crossing, which is also being upgraded as part of wider public realm improvements.

Clear signage and diversion routes will be in place to keep disruption to a minimum and businesses in

the area will remain open as usual.

The Shrub Hill Quarter regeneration is being led by Worcestershire County Council, Worcester City Council, and the Worcestershire Local Enterprise Partnership, with a shared vision to breathe new life into this key area of the city.

A British summer is like a game of weather roulette. One minute it's


blazing sunshine; the next you're sheltering under a tree with your chips in a soggy napkin. But that's half the fun.


#### 3. A Garden in Full **Voice**


Is it perfectly seared or questionably charred? It doesn't matter. The point is: it's outdoors, it's shared, and someone always forgets the ketchup.



## 4. Harvest Homegrown Goodness

Now's the time to reap the rewards of spring sowing.

Pick regularly to encourage more cropping:

- Courgettes (before they become marrows!)
- French & runner beans
- Tomatoes (as soon as they colour)
- Strawberries, raspberries & gooseberries
- Cut-and-come-again salad leaves Not only does regular picking boost production, but everything tastes better the moment it's picked.






