

# **£7m council tax debt leads to calls for help**

WYRE Forest District Council is owed £6.99million in unpaid council tax bills, according to the latest figures from the Ministry for Housing, Communities and Local Government. The amount of debt accrued by residents across

The amount of debt accrued by residents across Kidderminster, Stouport and Bewdley forms part of a national total now at \$6.6billion.

Charity National Debtline suggests, as council budgets have become more stretched, local authorities are increasingly reliant on council tax revenue to fund essential services. But, it believes this has also led to higher bills

But, it believes this has also led to higher bills overall, creating a vicious circle for many people already struggling to pay. Recent research from the Money Advice Trust,

Recent research from the Money Advice Trust, which runs the National Debtline, reveals as of March 2025, 2.2million people in England (five per cent) were behind on their council tax bill, suggesting many more be struggling with council tax arrars and had not yet sought beln

cil tax arrears and had not yet sought help. National Debtline is now calling for improved collection practices and greater investment in council tax support schemes to prevent people falling behind to begin with.

Steve Vaid, chief executive at Money Advice Trust, said: "Unless changes are made at a policy level arrears are likely to keen climbing"

cy level, arrears are likely to keep climbing." A quarter of people who call National Debtline for advice have council tax debt, averaging \$1,958 per person, making it one of the top three most common debts its advisers hear about.

Mr Vlad added councils had a vital role in helping residents with unmanageable bills to ensure council tax was collected in a way that is fair and affordable.

Current rules mean households can become liable for their full annual council tax bill if they

miss one payment, which often results in a quick escalation to bailiff action.

Last week, the Government set out proposals to extend this period, so people had more time to engage and seek support and the Ministry of Justice has announced plans to consult on giving the Enforcement Conduct Board legal powers to regulate the bailiff industry. National Debtline welcomed both these moves

National Debtline welcomed both these moves after a decade of campaigning.

#### **Council's response**

Coun David Ross, Wyre Forest District Council's Cabinet member for Finance and Capital Portfolio, said council tax had always been a vital source of funding and, as part of its corporate plan, the authority was committed to 'securing financial sustainability for services local communities valued and was increasing net income from its commercial activities to reduce reliance on council tax income'

He added the council consistently collected an average of 97.3 per cent of the council tax owed within the year.

He also said the debt figure included that owed to other organisations - not just Wyre Forest District Council - including Worcestershire County Council, the Office of the West Mercia Police and Crime Commissioner, Hereford and Worcester Fire Authority and town and parish councils.

The council has a debt recovery policy to make sure council tax is collected from all those liable to pay. Coun Ross added: "We are committed to

Coun Ross added: "We are committed to balancing the need for effective council tax collection with compassion and support for those in financial difficulty."

He added help was available for anyone struggling to pay their council tax and urged people in that situation to visit: wyreforestdc.gov.uk to find out more.

# **New centre to** transform lives

FORMER residen-A tial care home in Kidderminster has been transformed into a centre for supporting peo-ple with learning disabilities and complex needs.

Foley House has been taken over by Salutem Care and Education and will help adults facing these challenges to live fulfilling, independent lives within their community.

The premises, previously also operated by Salutem when it was a care home, was originally closed as part of Worcestershire County Council's wider strategy to increase opportunities for individuals to live in their own homes with tailored support

The people who previously lived at Foley were success-fully supported to move into a purpose-built supported liv-

ing environment nearby. Following its closure, Foley House was sold to Warwick Investments, which has since completed an extensive refurbishment project. The redesigned property

now features five accessible bedrooms, each with en-suite facilities, along with spacious communal areas, a landscaped garden, and a dedi-cated parking area.

The service is commis-sioned by Worcestershire County Council, with Inclusion Housing as the landlord and Warwick Investments as the developer.

Salutem will provide on-site support to enable the new tenants to live as independently as possible in a safe and enabling environment.

Three people have already been identified to move in, with assessments ongoing to



find people who would benefit from the remaining two spaces It is anticipated that ten-

ants will begin moving into their new home later this month

Sally Jobling, divisional director for Supported Living at Salutem, said: "We are delighted to be returning to Foley House in a new capac-ity, supporting people to live more independently in a beautiful and thoughtfully

redeveloped setting. "We are proud to work alongside Worcestershire County Council, Inclusion and Warwick Investments to deliver modern housing solu-tions that reflect the indi-vidual needs and aspirations

of the people we support." Alexsandra Smith, operations manager at Inclusion Housing, said: "This development is another great example of partnership working between our organisations to deliver great quality accommodation, we look forward to welcoming our new tenants

# Stepping up campaign to save Maypole Piece

THE FRIENDS of Maypole Piece have provided an update on the campaign to save the historic green space in Wribbenhall which has been **put up for sale.** The land has been at the centre of the

community for generations but there are fears - depending on who buys it - that it could be developed People of all ages have fond memories of

the area - from the bonfire to celebrate the end of the Second World War and Major Webb riding his horse there on a Sunday to fetes and football matches on the hill. It also provides habitats for a wealth of local wildlife.

Wildlife. The Friends of the Maypole group wants to buy the land and place it in public trust ownership so it can be enjoyed by genera-tions of people in Wribbenhall, Bewdley and the wider area for many years to come.

As part of the campaign, representatives of the Friends of Maypole Piece were able to speak at a Bewdley Town Council meet-ing on June 9 to ask for formal support and calling on the authority to give serious consideration to designating Maypole Piece es an official Green Speace to program it for as an official Green Space to preserve it for future generations

#### **Campaign** latest

The Friends group has been informed that no decision has yet been made on Lot 1 (which contains the Maypole).

The group has been told it is seen as a credible group.

A spokesperson for the Friends of Maypole Piece said: "It is thanks to you all, we have

shown we have huge support and can raise

funds quickly, and in significant amounts. "We remain hopeful that we can buy the Maypole element of Lot 1 and have asked the agent to speak to those who have made an offer on the lot, explain our vision and willingness to work together." The charity application is nearly ready for

submission - the current timescale for the process is 28 days to six weeks.

Once the group has its charity number, it will have access to apply for a significant amount of funds.

# **New group** aims to offer vital support to others

A WOMAN who lost her leg is setting up a support group for fellow amputees after finding there was not much help across Worcestershire for people in a similar position to her.

It began when Kate Andrews, a Type 1 diabetic from Bromsgrove, was on holiday in Gran Canaria and had a blister on her foot.

Within 24 hours it had become bright red and, as she was due to return to the UK, she flew home. Gangrene set in and she had to

have her leg amputated below the knee.

She told the Standard: "Within two months, I had to change my life completely - I lost my car as I could not drive and that meant I

lost my job. "I worked in care, helping young people with challenging behaviour, autism and special needs

"It was the best job in the world.

She needed to make big changes to her life and it was then she real-ised there really was no help across

The group she is setting up will meet from 1pm to 3pm on the first Friday of the month at the Golden Cross Hotel (Wetherspoons) in Bromsgrove High Street and be a welcoming space where Worcestershire's amputees can connect, share and support one another. The first meeting is next Friday, July 4. She said: "The staff at the hospital

were great and did all they could for me but they are nurses at the end of the day and not specialists in the kind of care amputees need." She has been well-supported by

her husband Tony and her son but said there would be others who had no-one to turn to.

Kate has since become a Befriender with Age UK Bromsgrove, Redditch and Wyre Forest (BRWF) which and sees her call elderly residents and visit them to help combat loneliness

She also wants to raise awareness of foot health. She said: "People do not check

their feet enough - I didn't before this

"It is especially important for those with underlying conditions, like diabetes, but this could happen to anyone.

Kate hopes to bring about further real change for amputees in Worcestershire so there is more help for them.

And her calls are backed by Wyre Forest District Councillor Fran Oborski who, herself an amputee, agrees there is not much help for amputees in Worcetershire. She said: "There is some initial support but after that that, you are

left to your own devices.

She added, being a councillor, she was in a fortunate position as she knew who to contact for items, such as disabilities facilities grants for home modifications, wet rooms

and specialist equipment. "With the trauma of an amputa-tion, you are not in the best frame of mind and need some help - at least in the first few weeks.

"There needs to be more collabo-ration - at least a list detailing who amputees can contact for what."

# A taste of Karen cleans up, landing **BEM in King's Honours**

AN INSPIRATIONAL antilitter campaigner who runs activities across the county said she was 'truly blown away' to receive a British Empire Medal in the King's Birthday Honours for the work she does. Karen Blanchfield, from Stourport,

is a Keep Britain Tidy ambassa-dor, a Wyre Forest Scout Leader and founder of the Droitwich-based Little Litter Warriors. She told the Standard she was

absolutely delighted when she found out about her award.

"A letter arrived from the Cabinet

Office stating that I had been rec-ommended to His Majesty The King for the honour of the BEM for services to environmental educa-tion and that the Prime Minister had endorsed the award. "I had to read it a few times and,

when the news finally sank in, I was truly blown away and honoured."

#### How it began

Karen said it all started for her when she and her daughter Chloe - who was ten at the time - first participated in the Great British Spring Clean in 2019.

"Chloe was very concerned about the impact of litter on animals and, as a mother, I felt compelled to

address her anxiety positively. "I realised that littering behaviours were not improving despite clean-up efforts, so I started volunteering in schools and community groups.

Karen conducted engaging litter workshops to show children how people could work together to 'love where they lived' and 'look after communities

"During the lockdown, I developed an educational resource for schools called the Little Litter Warriors programme, which was commission by Wychavon District Council for their 63 schools."

The programme includes litter workshops, classroom activities, and educational materials, focusing on litter management and plastic pollution, with an aim to expand the Adopt a Street scheme.

The workshops are designed for children to collect litter, examine each material and observe how long it has been in the environment. They are also tasked with looking into the harm it may have caused to the wildlife and learning how to integrate their daily waste packaging materials into the circular waste movement.

Karen said: "I have delivered assembly presentations across numerous schools, classroom activities and hundreds of litter work-

# Changes in structure should help **boost SEND** services for youngsters

WORCESTERSHIRE County Council is implementing a new structure for its Special Needs Educational and Disabilities (SEND) Services, designed to improve the experience of children, young people and their families as they navigate the Education, Health and

Care (EHC) process. Recent feedback from parent car-ers has highlighted several areas where change was needed.

#### 'Improving access'

In response, the council is mak-ing several structural changes, aimed at delivering more timely, accessible, and effective support. These changes are not about cutting costs - they are focused on service improvement.

easier, even when individual EHCP Co-ordinators are unavailable.

Casework officers are now going to be called 'EHCP co-ordinators' as families reported that they did not like children being referred to as a 'case'

#### Timeframe

The council has been making changes throughout June and July with the new structure fully in place from September 1, 2025, in time for the next academic year.

Worcestershire County Council has advised families could continue to contact their current EHCP co-ordinator and the SEND Services Team via the usual channels and will be updated as and when things change.

The number of children and young people with EHCPs continues to rise – from 6,530 in September 2024 to 7,339 in April 2025.

Coun Dr Stephen Foster, cabinet member with responsibility for edu-cation and SEND, said: "We know that families have not always had the experience they should expect when it comes to EHCPs and SEND "These changes reflect a first

step to doing better. "We've made sure that teams are

properly resourced, more acces-sible, and better structured to meet rising demand. "The progress made in timeliness

is encouraging - however, there is much more to do.

"We are fully committed to engaging with families and listen-ing to their experiences as further improvements are developed in the months ahead.

# Drive to help smokers to kick habit is hailed as a big success

A PROGRAMME offering support for hospital patients in Worcestershire to stop smoking has proved a huge success helping to save lives, free up hospital bed spaces, and save the NHS hundreds of thousands of pounds in treatment.

of pounds in treatment. The NHS-funded programme at Worcestershire Acute Hospitals NHS Trust is offered to all adult inpatients and pregnant women who smoke.

The first year of the programme has seen successful results with 57 per cent of those accepting the offer saying they have quit smoking after just four weeks.

Longbridge

Since launching in 2024, the Tobacco Dependency Prevention Programme has delivered significant outcomes.

The data from the Inpatient Tobacco Dependency Service Calculator reveals the programme has freed up the equivalent of 1.4 hospital bed spaces per day, saved 52 lives, and reduced hospital readmissions resulting in a cost saving of \$253,196.

A dedicated maternity tobacco dependency service is also on offer, supporting all pregnant women who smoke at the time of their first appointment, as well as household members who smoke.

Among pregnant women referred to the programme, 56% took up the offer of support, with 87 per cent of those setting a quit date and half of them remaining smoke free at the time of their delivery.

Support is delivered through face to face appointments – either at home or at hospital locations – ensuring services are accessible to individual needs.

In recognition of the success of the programme at the Trust, NHS England gave the service a Grade A rating after achieving its Level One Service Quality for demonstrating a commitment to best practice, reducing health inequalities, and involving patients in the design and delivery of care.

Clare Rochelle, Lead Tobacco Dependency Nurse at Worcestershire Acute Hospitals NHS Trust said: "Smoking tobacco is the leading modifiable risk factor for health inequalities. Treating tobacco dependence when someone is admitted to hospital, regardless of their intention to stop smoking, enables a faster recovery and earlier discharge, reduces their risk of readmission and death from their acute illness.

# Warning issued over measles resurgence as cases start to rise

HEALTH chiefs have issued a warning to parents after an increase in measles cases across the West Midlands and the UK.

And, as many people get ready for summer travel, there are fears over further outbreaks. According to the UK Health

Security Agency, measles outbreaks will continue across the UK, with 109 confirmed cases in April and

86 in May.

The cases were predominantly found in unvaccinated children

aged 10 years or under. Of these, there have been seven confirmed cases within the West Midlands and almost half of all cases occurring in London. This increase coincides with an increasing number of measles cases

within Europe as a whole.

'Serious illness'

UK Health Security Agency Regional Deputy Director in the West Midlands, Katie Spence, said: "Measles can cause serious illness and while most people will recover completely within a couple of weeks, the virus can sometimes leave permanent disability and can even be fatal. "Measles is

very infectious and

can spread rapidly among communi-ties, if people have not had at least one dose of the MMR vaccine." January Since there have been laboratory 420 confirmed measles

cases reported in England, with a number of regions reporting outbreaks. A total of 25

per cent of cases appeared within the North West and 11 per cent in the West Midlands.

People are urged to receive vaccina-tions, which have prevented at least 20million cases 4,500 deaths and in the UK since its

introduction in 1968. The UK Health Security Agency fears cases may increase as UK citizens, specifically those with young children, travel for the summer.

#### Those most at risk

Infants aged under one year and people with weakened immune sys-tems are at a larger risk of serious illness and complications upon contracting the disease, though there are also many reported cases among healthy young people and adults

Consultant Epidemiologist at the UK Health Security Agency, Dr Vanessa Saliba, said: "It's essential Vanessa Saliba, said: 'It's essential everyone, particularly parents of young children, check all family members are up-to-date with two MMR doses, especially if you are travelling this summer holidays or disking with visiting family. "Measles spreads very easily and

can be a nasty disease, leading to complications like ear and chest infections and inflammation of the brain with some children tragically ending up in hospital and suffering

life-long consequences." People are urged to contact their GP surgery if they believe they have not received two doses of the

vaccine. This is especially important if they are about to start college or university, are travelling overseas, are planning a pregnancy, are a

frontline health or social care worker or if they work with young children.

National Director for Primary Care and Community Services at NHS England, Dr. Amanda Doyle, said: "The first MMR vaccine is offered to infants when they turn one and the second dose to pre-school children when they are around three years and four months old.

"Around 99 per cent of those who have two doses will be protected against measles and rubella."

#### Symptoms

People should be aware of mea-

sles' symptoms. They usually start with cold-like symptoms, such as a high tem-perature, a runny or blocked nose, sneezing, a cough and red, sore, watery eyes.

These are followed by a rash a few days later which starts on the face and behind the ears before spreading to the rest of the body. Some people may also get small spots in their mouth.

Anyone who suspects they or their child has measles should call NHS 111 or their GP to get an appointment.

People are being urged to be aware of measles symptoms, which include a rash that spreads to the whole body, s

# Animal charities urge cat owners to ensure pets are microchipped

CAT OWNERS are being urged to ensure they get their pets microchipped as figures reveal some over a fifth of the country's feline friends do not comply with the law.

June 10 marked the first anniversary of the law which made it a legal requirement in England for owned cats over 20 weeks old to be microchipped.

microchipped. Despite this, the latest figures from PDSA found 22 per cent of cats in the UK were unchipped. Similar figures were released by the RSPCA which said only 27 per cent of the cats coming into its care were microchipmed.

The PDSA runs 49 pet hospitals across the UK and having carried out nearly 20,000 microchippings in the past year, over 12,600 of which were on cats.

PDSA vet nurse, Nina Downing, said: "We've seen many cat owners get on board and get their cat chipped. "Since June 10, 2024, when the cat

microchipping law came into force in England, up to May 30 this year, we microchipped almost 15,200 cats across our Pet Hospitals.

"This marks an increase of over 1.5 times compared to the same period in the previous year, when me microchipped almost 9,400 cats

"On average, we've seen more kitten and young cat owners come for microchipping appointments, which could mean those with older cats who have never been micro-chipped. have not yet compiled

with the new law." She added 63 per cent of appoint-ments were for cats aged one year old and under.

"Regardless of your cats age, we'd urge all cat owners to get their cats microchipped.

Nina added if owners had a cat which liked to explore the great outdoors, they may roam too far, or end up hurt or injured and unable to return home

"A microchip may be the only way your cat can be easily reunited with you.

"Even if your cat prefers the indoor life, microchipping is just as important, and legally required. "You may not be too worried if

you have an indoor cat, but there's plenty of ways cats can sneak outside, or nip out through an open door or window."

#### Concerning numbers

Alice Potter, RSPCA cat welfare expert, added: "It's concerning that one year on since this law came into effect and so many cats are still not being microchipped and ending up



in RSPCA care.

"It's possible many of these cats could have ended up back with their owners had they been chipped.

"It's important all cat owners in England understand the law and

their responsibilities when it comes to their pets. Figures from the PDSA show 91 per cent of pet owners say their

contact details are up-to-date which meant nine per cent were potentially incorrect and outdated. Thus, the charity added, would be a real issue if the pet was lost or stolen. It stressed that it was important

for owners to be aware of which database their pet's microchip was registered to and to keep the details up-to-date.

Ms Potter added: "We'd urge owners to ensure their cats are microchipped from 20 weeks of age and the details on the chip are always kept up-to-date.

#### Barriers

A poll carried out on RSPCA supporters at the start of the year found that over a third (36 per cent) said one of the most common challenges to microchipping their cat was the cost. A total of 21 per cent wrong-

ly believed having an indoor cat meant they did not needed to be chipped and a lack of vets or struggling to get a vet appointment (17 per cent) were other reasons given

per cent) were other reasons given for not getting cats chipped. Meanwhile, 11 per cent of respondents said they were una-ware of the law change making it compulsory in England. The RSPCA is also campaigning and lobbying the Welsh Government for cat microchipping to become compulsory in Wales

compulsory in Wales

# **Expert seeks** to reassure Harriers fans on finances

FOOTBALL: FOOTBALL finance expert Kieran Maguire has analysed Kidderminster Harriers' accounts for the 2023/24 season.

The club's accounts revealed Harriers lost in excess of 200k in 2023/24 bringing Kidderminster's cumulative losses to nearly &4million.

However, speaking exclu-sively to the Standard, finance expert Maguire did not see expert Maguire did not see anything particularly alarming regarding the club's current financial situation. Maguire exclusively told the Standard: "It seems quite bor-ing to me and boring is good. "They don't appear to have a lot of debt, they lost 200k last year and didn't spend any money signing players but

money signing players but most National League clubs

don't sign players for fees. "They lost 200k in a year but the average losses were 800k so it's okay.

"They're solid not spec-tacular but that's what you'd expect given where the club is in its history and geographically.

"Harriers have \$2million of debt so how is that going to be paid off? It looks like the money is coming from the owners. "The club is sensibly run and

sensibly managed." Maguire added: "There's lim-

ited scope for huge investments but they're doing enough to keep the lights on and to be broadly competitive. "The club doesn't publish its

income statement so we can't determine how much the revenues are or the wages due to the size of the club. "There's an awful lot of interest in National League

clubs from investors and some of those investors deliver as we've seen at Wrexham and

"Some owners get bored quickly, if you're running at a 200k loss and you've got nobody to put in that 200k that's when you've got a prob-lem but I don't see that at Harriers."
