

Police hunt men who stole woman's handbag

POLICE have released these pictures after a woman's handbag full of cash was stolen in Kidderminster during a distraction theft.

The incident happened around 12.50pm on June 23 when the woman parked in the Weaver's Wharf car park and went to Lloyds Bank on Vicar Street to withdraw cash before returning to her car. Between 12.58pm and 1pm she was dis-

Between 12.58pm and 1pm she was distracted by two men in the car park, after she had placed her bag containing \$1,000 in cash on the passenger seat of her car.

One main claimed there was something under the car she needed to be aware of and the second man stole her handbag. He then gave the bag to a third man who

He then gave the bag to a third man who put it into a blue carrier bag and walked off up the Mall and along Vicar Street and High Street. He was seen, around 1.02pm, at the



bus stops at Coventry Street / Blackwell Street.

It is believed the other two men walked towards the canal and turned towards McDonald's on the towpath. PC Andrew Forbes, from the Kidderminster

Police town centre team, appealed for witnesses and said: "We are looking for any dash cam footage or eyewitnesses to identify any of the men or vehicles involved.

"We would also like to hear from anyone who may have information about the men seen in the hats in the first image and the man with the bag in the second image as we believe they may be able to help us with our enquiries."

SVR inspired to mark 200 years of rail

THE 'INSPIRATION' train. THE INSPIRATION train, which is touring the UK to celebrate the 200th anniver-sary of the British railway system, made its first stop in Kidderminster on Friday.

The train – aimed at inspiring interest in British railway history and careers in the industry – was welcomed by the Severn Valley Railway (SVR) on platform two of the Kidderminster Station.

It will be available to view by visitors until the end of Sunday, July 6, before it heads off to Birmingham Moor Street where Chiltern Railways will welcome visitors from July 8 to 10.

Denise Wetton, Network Rail's central route director, said: "The West Midlands are at the Heart of Britain's Railway, making it the perfect location for the first two stops of the Railway 200 national tour.

"This unique train will offer visitors an experience that show-



cases the railway's vital role in Britain's past, present, and future and I hope it inspires thousands of visitors from across the region who will be among the first in Britain to experience it." More than 200,000 people are

expected to visit the 'inspiration' train as it travels across Britain in the next 12 months, visiting a total of 60 locations.

The celebration is also aimed at inspiring young people and

The train consists of four carriages: 'Railway Firsts' showcases important moments showcases important moments in the development of the rail-way system and 'Wonderlab on Wheels' hosts interactive exhibits which allow visitors to test their engineering skills. 'Your Railway Future' presents some of the hid-den roles in the railway industry and 'Partner Zone' will vary as the train changes locations.

Emma Roberts, programme manager for Railway 200, said: This special exhibition train is a new, free national visitor attraction, offering an unforgettable

experience for hundreds of thousands of people across Britain, including many schoolchildren.

For the final two days of the Inspiration's train's stay in Kidderminster on Saturday and Sunday, there will be an additional showcase of various historic trains and other vehicles.

These include the current and cutting-edge LMS 46115 Scots Guardsman and the HydroFLEX, as well as steam and diesel locomotives such as the Highley and Autotrain

Massive flood as mains water pipe bursts

ROADS were flooded and homes were left without water after a mains pipe burst in Kidderminster last Friday.

Worcestershire County Council was forced to carry out emergency closures on roads as they became submerged following the incident in Green Street around 1.30pm.

Among the roads shut were Green Street, Castle Road, Dixon Street and The Ringway. Severn Trent sent its engi-

Ringway. Severn Trent sent its engineers to the area to carry out emergency repairs on the burst water mains.

When the floodwater subsided, some homes were still left without water, while others were left with poor pressure and discoloured water as it returned to their taps.



And on Monday, after the pipe was fixed and water supplies were reconnected, several roads were still closed, needing to be repaired because of the ferocity of the cascading water and the need for engineers to get to the nice.

the pipe. As the Standard went to press, a Severn Trent spokesperson told us: "Our team has now completed repairs to the burst on Green Street in Kidderminster. However, traffic management is still in place at Castle Road, Green Street, Dickson Street, and New Road while we repair the

"We would like to thank you to the council, the emergency services and those who were affected by the burst. "We know

"We know that roadworks can be disruptive and would

like to apologise for any inconvenience caused."

On Wednesday, Severn Trent said on its website: "Whilst the repair continues, we also have teams in the area working to restore the water around our network.

"As a result, you may experience lower water pressure and/or discoloured water as the supply returns.

"This is nothing to worry about and as our works progress your water supply will return to normal."

Police arrest boys over car theft

FOUR boys suspected of being involved in a car theft in Kidderminster have been arrested.

It followed a police chase on Sunday.

West Mercia Police said around 12.55pm, an authorised pursuit took place after officers spot-

ted a vehicle suspected to be involved in a car-key burglary. The car was heading towards Kidderminster and its tyres were successfully punctured by officers using a stinger. As the driver of the suspect vehicle tried to make off, it collided with two other vehicles on Norton Road in Stourbridge.

Stourbridge. Four boys – three aged 17 and one aged 15 – were located and arrested after attempting to flee the scene.

Mobile phones, drugs and a hammer were seized from the vehicle. All four were held on

All four were held on suspicion of theft of a motor vehicle which related to an incident in Kidderminster on June 20. They were further arrested on suspicion of dangerous driving, failing to stop, and going equipped to steal. One of the 17-year-olds was also arrested on suspicion of driving whilst under the influence of drugs, driving without a licence and driving without insurance.

The 15-year-old has been bailed as enquiries continue and the other boys remain in police custody.

SVR goes full steam ahead for Ages event

TO COINCIDE with the Railway 200 Exhibition, Severn Valley Railway (SVR) has its 'Train Through The Ages Event' tomorrow and Sunday, July 5 and 6.

Ages Event' tomorrow and Sunday, July 5 and 6. SVR has a busy timetable with a number of locomotives working the line between Kidderminster and Hampton Loade from 9am to 7pm.

The event is a must for rail enthusiasts and admission entitles visitors to ride as many engines as they can in historic carriages.

People can also visit The Engine House at Highley, which is open from 9.30am to 5pm (last entry at 4.30pm) and sample real ales in the SVR's pubs.

Among the locomotives in service are the LMS 46115 Scots Guardsman, paired with the SVR's BR maroon carriages, thanks to David Smith and West Coast Railways.

The GWR 4930 Hagley Hall is paired with GWR carriages and the GWR 1450 will operate in push-pull mode with an Autocoach.

LMS Stanier Mogul 13268 will be paired with LMS carriages and a pre-grouping goods train and there will be the 1877-built Chaloner and 1902-built 'Holy War', narrow gauge footplate rides at The Engine House. by **Tristan Harris** tristan.harris@bullivantmedia.com

Others include BR Class 52 D1062 Western Courier, BR Class 50 50033 Glorious and BR Class 108 DMU. People can also see inside HydroFLEX, the UK's first hydrogen-ready passenger train, developed and tested by Porterbrook in Warwickshire, on display at Kidderminster

Northfield, Birmingham. A decade ago, at the age of just 11, Grace, who had severe scolio-

sis, had spinal fusion surgery. Scoliosis is a condition where the spine is curved, limiting breathing, heart function and

digestion. The 12-hour procedure left Grace with two titanium rods and

23 screws in her spine. Despite having this metalwork in her spine, Grace is proving that people with scoliosis can lead full and active lives and proved that when spectock on the proved that when she took on the Birmingham Half Marathon.

Grace said: "On the starting line I felt so nervous. I wanted to make sure I just absorbed it all.

"There were so many people on the starting line who felt the same but for me, this was kind of my victory lap, celebrating what my

Man injured as car ends up in field

A CAR crashed in Bewdley and ended up on its side in a field. The incident happened around 12.30am on Tuesday

in Arley Lane, Shatterford. A Hereford and Worcester Fire and Rescue Service crew from Wyre Forest Fire Station was called and, after ascer-taining no-one was trapped, made the vehicle safe. Two people had got them-

REVIEW: Little Shop of Horrors, Theatre 282

LITTLE Shop of Horrors is a musical with a bit of everything – dark comedy, bizarre scenarios, moral dilemmas and even some touching

moments. It is a roller-coaster of emotion and tone. It centres on a failing flower shop when an unexpected opportunity, in the form of a mys-terious plant, presents itself. With that, comes a growing appetite for fame, fortune and fresh blood, that just might change lives. The first half sets the scene with catchy toe-tapping numbers and plenty of comedy. The second one takes on a more sinister turn, raises moral dilemmas and manages, somehow, to keep the comedy, albeit darker. This was Theatre 282's first musi-

cal and the talented cast did a sterling job telling the tale of this cult classic.

Everyone played their part in the production. Andy Partington was great as shop owner Mr Mushnik – both capturing the character and competent as he sang in the musical numbers he was involved in.

CA People CA Places The Circle of Care: How Support Travels Through a Community

Care has a quiet momentum. It doesn't shout. It doesn't seek credit. But when one person chooses to help another, something remarkable happens – it spreads.

Welcome to the Circle of Care: an invisible, ever-turning wheel powered by acts of kindness, big and small. In towns, villages, and cities across the country, people are stepping up for each other – and in doing so, sparking a chain reaction of compassion.

It often starts with something simple. A hot meal left on a doorstep. A schoolchild giving up their seat on the bus. A stranger paying for the coffee of the person behind them in the queue. These gestures might feel fleeting to the giver, but to the person on the receiving

And volunteers at those events? Some were recipients of care themselves, now giving back in kind.

This is the Circle of Care in motion. It grows not by obligation, but by invitation. It says: You've helped me – I want to help someone else.

At the heart of this cycle is connection. Care doesn't exist in a vacuum. When we see someone doing good, we're often reminded of our own power to contribute. It's why communities respond so passionately to fundraising pages, food drives, or community clean-up days. They aren't just supporting a cause – they're continuing a story. And it's not always the obvious moments that carry the most weight. A listening ear. A ride to a doctor's appointment. Watching a neighbour's child for an hour so they can rest. These are small acts – but they build trust, dignity, and belonging. They lay the foundation





for a community where people feel safe to both give and receive care. In schools, children are learning this too. Many are now taking part in kindness challenges – writing positive notes for classmates, helping with litter picks, or raising funds for local charities. Teachers report that once a culture of kindness takes hold, it becomes self-sustaining. "One child brings in a tin for the food bank, and suddenly the whole class is donating," said one headteacher. "They inspire each other."

Businesses are joining the circle as well. A bakery offering leftover loaves to a shelter.

A taxi firm giving discounted rides to cancer patients. A florist donating unsold blooms to a hospice. These aren't marketing stunts – they're reflections of what it means to be rooted in community.

But the beauty of the Circle of Care is that you don't need to wait for permission to enter it. You only need to ask: What can I do, right now, with what I have? And that answer will look different for everyone. For some, it's time. For others, it's resources. For many, it's simply attention – noticing when someone is struggling and showing up. Even digital communities are catching on. Local Facebook groups often help this local newspaper and help act as the new town square – offering everything from babysitting swaps to urgent appeals for missing pets. Behind each post is a person reaching out, and another person reaching back.

And when care flows in a circle, no one is left behind. Those who give today may need help tomorrow. Those who receive today may be the first to offer it next time. It's not a straight line. It's a cycle. A rhythm. A shared responsibility.

So if you've ever wondered whether a small act of kindness really makes a difference – know this: it does. Not just to the person you helped, but to the person they go on to help. And the one after that. And the one after that. Because care is contagious. And once it's set in motion, it rarely stops. Let's keep it turning.

Linda's growning reputation nets her a top Plant Heritage accolade

A RENOWNED plant expert and collector from Hagley has won a prestigious award for her decades-long efforts in horticultural conservation.

Linda Eggins, a Japanese lau-rel (Aucuba Japonica) expert and National Plant Collection Holder, has won Plant Heritage's prestigious Brickell Award 2025.

The award - named after the Plant Heritage charity's founding member and vice president Chris Brickell - cel-ebrates excellence in cultivated plant conservation. The judges commended Linda for

her dedicated research and conserva-tion efforts over several decades.

In particular, they noted her impor-ant work to untangle the plant tant group's complicated names and clas-sifications, as well as her collaboration with others, including sharing her knowledge and plant material across the UK and internationally.

Through her passion for these plants and her storytelling, she has helped to persuade others to appreci-ate their diversity and their interesting history

Linda said the accolade was a great

honour. "I certainly didn't think when my late husband and I started the collec-tion in 1976 in our back garden, I'd



be awarded at RHS Hampton Court Palace Garden Festival for my contribution to the genus.

"I can hardly believe it." Linda was presented the Brickell Award 2025 by The Royal Park's head of horticulture Matthew Pottage on Monday at Plant Heritage's stand at RHS Hampton Court Palace Garden

Festival.

Her and her late husband initially started the Aucuba collection in their garden in Clent before being carefully transferred to Winterbourne House and Garden in Birmingham in 2016.

Here, visitors can admire cultivars planted out in the garden and the collection itself is proudly displayed on the University of Birmingham campus for the public to see.

Linda has published several articles, reports and even a book ('A Virgin for Eighty Years – Aucuba, An Overlooked Treasure') in 2021, telling the fascinating story of why the first plants brought back from Japan failed to produce their trademark

berries. She did a month-long tour of Japan to see native Aucuba japonica growing in the wild, how they are propagated, grown and developed in nurseries and used in public spaces and gardens.

She is now considered an international authority on all things Aucuba. Every year, Linda collects propa-gated material as required, keeps an inventory of back-up plants and has even donated specimens to prestigious botanical gardens worldwide, including Birmingham Botanical Gardens and Glasshouses, The Harold Hillier Arboretum, Bodenham Arboretum and The Raulston Arboretum in the USA.

USA. Gwen Hines, CEO at Plant Heritage, said: "Linda has dedicated many years of her life to under-standing, growing and caring for Aucuba japonica and telling their story, which is inspiring.

"Her passion shines through and her important contributions to plant conservation make her a worthy win-ner for our Brickell Award 2025."
