Appeal to find a new home for vital charity

A MUCH-LOVED charity which serves the people of Wyre Forest has launched an appeal to find a new base after having to leave its current home in Kidderminster.

For years, Simply Limitless has supported the health and wellbeing of the local com-munity, offering everything from mental health support and physical activity sessions to social groups which help tackle loneliness and isola-

The charity said the move from Walter Nash Road came as a result of changes in tenancy arrangements and the news had left staff, vol-unteers and service users

deeply saddened.

"The building has become a vital community hub and leaving it will be a huge loss to many who rely on the services Simply Limitless pro-vides," it added.

The charity has now found itself in a race against time as it has to be out by August 8 and has appealed for urgent help.

Lisa McNally, director of public health for Worcestershire, has shared her support.

She said: "The Simply Limitless team do an amazing job supporting the health and

wellbeing of local people.
"They provide a wide range

of support aimed at helping people thrive, both physically and mentally. I really hope they can find a new home from which to operate their invaluable service.

"The charity is now urgently looking for a new venue in the Wyre Forest – ideally one that is central, accessible and affordable.

"The team would be incredibly grateful for any support from the local community in identifying potential spaces or offering assistance during this challenging transition.

Since putting out the appeal, Simply Limitless has thanked everyone for their incredibly kind words and offers of support and encouragement'.

"It means so much to all of the staff volunteers and the people that charity sup-ports," the charity said.

The charity requires a hall or open space capable of holding around 60 people and office space for 10 peo-

College offers students their own SPACE to grow

KIDDERMINSTER College has opened the doors to SPACE (Safe Place And Calm Environment), a support centre for students aged 16 and up with Special Educational Needs and **Disabilities** (SEND).

Funded by \$279,312 worth of investment from Worcestershire County Council, SPACE aims to prepare students for life after college and provide them with a compared to the contract of the contr fortable environment away from the

overwhelming college day. Construction began

August 2024 and was finished

in February this year.
Among the features at SPACE are a fully-functional and accessible kitchen, a realistic one-bedroom flat, a quiet student common room and two relaxing sensory rooms.

These are designed to pro

vide a safe place for SEND students, where they can practise fundamental life skills such as cooking and laundry

or unwind in a quiet environment.

The specialised sensory rooms



provide emotional regulation and a relaxing environment, which can be tailored to individual students'

Kidderminster College vice principal, Claire Heywood, said: "We're proud to offer inclusive education for students with SEND across our full range of courses.

"Through this project, we've enhanced our SEND facilities, offering specialist spaces designed to support independence and well-

being."
Kidderminster College offers a range of learning support The training kitchen at the college which prepares students for life when they have finished their courses. s

and specialist course pro-vision for students with SEND, ensuring they are well-supported in difficult aspects of college life. Worcestershire County

Council's cabinet mem-ber with responsibility for education and SEND, Coun Dr Stephen Foster, said: "It's fantastic to see the courses and dedicated staff in

place to support students as they move on to their next steps in life and we're proud to have been able to help Kidderminster College to

make that possible."
Students have been able to access SPACE since May of this year, and have particularly been enjoying developing their hospi tality and customer service skills in a safe environment to support their increasing independence into adulthood and the world of work.

Firm hopes trade will be better as road is re-opened

A KIDDERMINSTER business has expressed its relief at the end of the road closures following the burst water mains which happened in the town a fortnight ago.

The mains pipe burst in Green Street on June 27 and caused mass flooding in that road and the surrounding areas.

Severn Trent spent most of that week-end fixing the pipe and roadworks were needed - both because of the ferocity of the water and the need to gain access to the mains.

But, some of the roads in the area

were still shut up until last weekend.
One of the businesses - Foynes Carpets on the New Road Complex - told the Standard it had severely impacted on the business because it had caused access issues for potential customers.

Issues for potential customers.

The shop has been in the town since 1983 and, although Christmas is its busiest time of year, many people still buy its products, including carpets and flooring, at this time of year.

Dean Martin, who works there, said:

"Trade has dropped off drastically over the past two weeks - it has been a night-mare." works last week and it all looked ready to open so it was frustrating it was still

The roadworks were finally completed

at the weekend and the roads reopened. But Paul Phillips, who also works at Foynes, said trade had still been slow this week and there were concerns that people had not realised the road had reopened and were still using their

diverted routes.

"We want people to know the road is open again and hope that our trade returns to its usual levels soon."

Severn Trent said the roadworks were lifted at the weekend, adding it took so long because the tarmac needed to fully and properly set in the heat before vehi-cles could safely use it.
"We are incredibly thankful to the local community for their patience and

understanding after we repaired and fixed what was a large, complex repair in the area.

ing - there are so many fantastic songs in the James Bond films.



Policing conference enables discussions

THE MUM of a Kidderminster woman who was killed in a road crash has spoken at an event which provided stark statistics, shocking stories and insights into policing

methods.
Leanne Vaughan featured at the Evidence Based Policing Conference

at the University of Worcester.

Leanne's daughter - 17-year-old

Lily-May - was killed in a crash.

She spoke about how the Serious Collision Investigation Unit led its probes and how policing on the

roads could prevent harm.

She said: "Having once had my voice stifled by the criminal justice system, the invitation to speak at the conference was profoundly meaningful

"If my words prompt even one person to reflect, Lily-May's story will have made a difference."

The event, attended by students, staff, and representatives from a host of organisations, addressed topics ranging from serious domes-

to abuse to deaths on our roads.

Other speakers included criminology experts Professor Jane Monckton-Smith and Dr Gillian Harrop, as well as the Chief Constable of West Mercia Police.

Also speaking at the conference were the father of a woman who was killed by her ex-partner and the mother of a girl killed in a road traffic incident.



Nick Gazzard OBE's daughter Hollie was just 20 when she was stabbed by her ex-boyfriend while she worked at a hair salon. He has since set up a trust in her name and campaigned to educate young peo-

ple about domestic violence.
Prof Jane Monckton Smith opened the conference with the keynote address, where she discussed statistics relating to domestic abuse, honour killings and partner killings. She also discussed cases she has

worked on in recent years around coercive control and 'staged homicide', where a murder is staged as an accident or a suicide.

Michelle Clarke, head of the School of Law at the University of

Worcester, said: "We are committed to ensuring we do everything we can do to inform the discussion around how we reduce harm in our society, in all its forms.

"This Evidence Based Policing

Conference was a chance to look at the experience and expertise of some incredibly knowledgeable and influential people and see how it can be applied to modern policing methods

"If we can change the course of behaviours in just one person, we could save a life. Events like this have the potential to enable those changes on a societal basis.

THE NEXT Kidderminster Canal and Food Festival takes place this weekend in the town centre.



Park thrilled to see birth of two red panda cubs

TWO rare red panda twins cub have born at Midlands Safari Park in Bewdley.
The birth came as

milestone moment as the species is listed as endangered.

Keepers suspected there may be more than one cute surprise after noticing how 'round' mum Mei Lin was

during her pregnancy.

Then on the morning of June 16, they started to hear some squeaks coming from one of the nest

A few days later, Mei Lin A few days later, Mei Lin was seen moving a cub to a different nest box and keepers were overjoyed when she went back to then collect a second cub.

The twin cubs are a first for the park in its history and second time mum, five-year-old Mei Lin, gave birth exactly two years to the day



of her first cub in 2023.

Head keeper of iscovery Trail, Discovery Trail, Amy Sewell, said everyone was thrilled to welcome the two panda cubs, adding they were not incredibly special not just for the team - but for the wider conservation effort of this endangered

species.

"It is thought the wild population is less than 10,000 individuals," she

"Every successful birth helps to secure a future for red pandas, whose numbers in the wild continue to decline.

The two cubs are in the nest boxes, in the care of mum Mei Lin with little disturbance from the keepers.

For the next few weeks, keepers will continue to monitor the cubs and Mei Lin from a safe distance, allowing her the time she needs to adapt to becoming

a mum of two.
Staff said the secret of
the birth was hard to keep as some guests in the park's Red Panda Cottages caught glimpses of the cubs, whilst

One of the first guests to spot the cubs was Mari Mascarenhas, a GP from Perth, Western Australia, on holiday with her partner Ty and daughter Alice, vis-

iting family in the UK.

Mari, who booked the trip for 10-year-old Alice, trip for 10-year-old Alice, who absolutely adores red pandas, said, "We planned this trip with the hope of giving Alice a chance to see them up close, and we were beyond thrilled with the experience.

"Not only did we get to see the red pandas, but we also caught the first glimpses of the new cubs, which was truly magical.

mer Lin arrived at the park in August 2021 and was joined by male, Sanka, in March 2022, as part of an EEP (Eaza Ex-Situ Programme) – a collaboration between European zoos to conserve endan-gered species.

Red pandas are endangered because of threats to their habitats due to humans and poaching and hunting of them is also on the rise.

The park supports the Red Panda Network (RPN), committed to the conservation of wild red pandas and their habitat through the education and empower-ment of local communities. The park sponsors a forest guardian who helps monitor and protect wild red pandas and their habitats

The sex of the cubs will be known when they are around 16 weeks, when around 16 weeks, when they start to venture out of the nest boxes on their own.

Their names will then be chosen - all baby animals born at the safari park this year will have names start-

year will have names starting with the letter 'N'.

Sword surrender

NINJA swords are set to be banned in the UK later this summer prompting West Mercia Police to offer surrender bins for the weap-

From August 1, it will become illegal to possess or make ninja swords.

Ahead of this ban, the Home Office has launched a month-long surrender and compensation scheme that will run throughout

July.

West Mercia Police, ahead of the ban, are urging anyone who owns these weapons to safely hand them into police stations before

sately hand them into police stations before midnight on August 1.

Throughout July, on Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm, the following police stations are prepared to take the surrendered swords - Telford Police Station, Kidderminster Police Station, Shrewsbury Police Station, Hereford Police Station and Worcester Police Station.

When giving in the harmful weapons, owners will be eligible for figancial componention.

When giving in the harmful weapons, owners will be eligible for financial compensation if given proof the ninja sword was purchased before March 27, 2025.

Owning, manufacturing, importing and selling ninja swords will be against the law at the end of this surrender period.

Supt Brian Gibbs, head of prevention for West Mercia Police said: "We are in full support of this scheme which will be removing these unnecessary and life-threatening weapons from our communities. ons from our communities

"We have sadly seen the destruction and devastation these weapons have brought to victims, their families and the officers who have to respond to incidents that involve

"This is a good opportunity for anyone who possesses such a weapon to bring them to one of the designated police stations and help get them out of our communities and off our streets."

THESE stunning images taken by our photographer **Marcus Mingins** show the duckweed which has amassed in Stourport basin during the hot weather.

The aquatic plant almost gives the impression that the waterway has been carpeted or

According to the Worcestershire Wildlife Trust (WWT), duckweed species can be dif-ficult to tell apart and it has not had confirmation of the species growing in Stourport

However, common duckweed is a natural

and common part of freshwater ecosystems that have slow flowing-water, such as ponds or canals

The WWT said: "Individual duckweeds are very small, often only a few millimetres in diameter, and have single roots that sit directly in the water, allowing them to absorb water and nutrients.

"Each plant can produce two daughter plants, essentially clones, every two to three days when the conditions are right.
"Due to the sunny, warm weather and their

ability to absorb nutrients from water, the conditions are likely to

have been perfect for duckweed to have carpeted waterbodies.

According to the trust, common duckweed is native and wildlife, including ducks, geese and swans, will eat it and it can provide shel-

and it can provide siter-ter for amphibians.

Duckweed provides
competition for algae,
which thrive in sunny,
warm conditions but, if duckweed completely covers a waterbody, it can cause issues by blocking out sunlight and it can also lead to

deoxygenated water which can cause prob-

lems for fish and other aquatic wildlife.

The WWT said: "The Canal and River Trust will have their own vegetation management plans but if people find that they have excessive duckweed in their garden ponds there are ways to manage it. you can scoop it out with a net, stick, sieve or rake and leave it beside the water to allow anything living in it

to escape, before composting it or responsibly disposing of it."

It is recommended at least 50 per cent of the duckweed in water is left so any wildlife relying on it as a food source or for cover still

And, when working with water, it is strongly advised to wear gloves and wash hands afterwards.

Local cardiologist to lead research work

A SPECIALIST heart doctor from Worcestershire's hospitals will lead a research project to try to identify those at risk of rare, life-threatening heart conditions so they get an earlier diagnosis and treatment.

Consultant cardiologist Dr David Wilson has got a grant from pharmaceutical giant Pfizer to set up specialist heart screening clinics in Worcestershire to spot people who could develop Transthyretin Amyloidosis Cardiomyopathy (ATTR-CM).

The condition was previously considered untreatable and can lead to progressive heart failure or death if left undiagnosed.

Using a digital platform called TriNetX, Dr Wilson, who is from Malvern, will input a list of diagnoses such as carpal tunnel syndrome and spinal stenosis that are known to be more likely to be present in those with ATTR-CM.

The TriNetX system is used at Worcestershire Acute Hospitals NHS Trust enables researchers to identify patients eligible for clinical trials through advanced searches of anonymised hospital electronic records.

Those patients are then invited to a specialist screening clinic for further testing, which includes an ECG recording, echocardiogram, blood and urine tests, and a full clinical history and examination.

history and examination.

If initial assessment suggests the possibility of ATTR-CM, the patient will be referred to the West Midlands Amyloid Service for confirmation



testing, early treatment, and potential enrolment in further clinical tri-

Dr Wilson said: "This grant allows us to carry out this research into ATTR-CM which has the potential to bring transformational benefits to patients with earlier diagnosis and therefore earlier and more effective treatment against this life-threatening condition."



New lion cubs venture out for the first time - ready for the summer holiday visitors

THREE lion cubs at West Midlands Safari Park have made their first public appearance, delighting visitors to the venue. The 12-week old cubs ventured out into their habitat. Nero, Nox and Nancy - all animals born at the park this year have names beginning with 'N' - were encouraged by their mum, 12-year-old Amber, as they met the rest of the pride for the first time.

Head keeper of carnivores, Kasha Carter, said Amber needed to check out the surroundings before her cubs came out.

"She then encouraged her cubs to follow her out and all three were fairly confident but kept close to mum."

Kasha noted that, after spending lots of time near the lion house, they soon started to play with sticks and in the bushes and had their first encounters with butterflies and a passing gull for the first time.

Later on, they then met halfsister Hernatty and pride member Dakota who showed them new areas to explore and things to do in the habitat, such as watching the hooftstock on the other side of the fence line. The trio of cubs first arrived in April 2025, amidst a baby boom, following the birth of three



Sumatran tiger cubs, an Indian rhino calf, two blesbok calves and a barasingha fawn.
Keepers said the birth of the cubs was extremely significant, as lions were currently classed as 'vulnerable' in the wild by the IUCN (International Union for the Conservation of Nature). This is due to recent studies showing that lions now exist in only 6% of their historic range, demonstrating severe declines from habitat loss and prey depletion, as well as human-lion conflict.

Now the cubs have had their

first day out, their next steps will be introducing them to the rest of the pride, starting with the females and then eventually the males, including dad, Tsavo. The cubs big brothers, Hodge, Havoc and Harabi, can be seen with their half brother Hercules on Lion ridge in the safari walk area of the park.

Safari Park animals chill out during heatwave with frozen treats

Creatures big and small at West Midlands Safari Park have been treated to ice lollies to help them keep cool during the recent heatwave.

As temperatures soared, keepers had been busy making frozen treats for the animals in their care, by suspending the animals' favourite foods in ice. Tiny blueberry and apple ice blocks were made for the minuscule meerkats, whereas the

African elephants had huge fruit, their favourite fruity treats such vegetables and browse ice lollies, moulded using large buckets. Discovery Trail Keeper, Jenny Garde, said, "As animal keepers it is important that we ensure the animals in our care stay comfortable during hot weather spells. One of the ways we do this is by providing them with frozen enrichment. For the lemurs and meerkats, this means making them ice lollies which contain

as apple and blueberry. "A lot of the other animals around the Park, such as the sea lions and elephants, have



nice pools to dip in, but their keepers also provide them with

"The frozen treats not only provide the animals with cool relief but also stimulate their brains as they have to work out how to get to the suspended delights inside. Just like with us



humans, they always go down a treat!'

For the California sea lions, their ice treat also doubled as a birthday cake for Callum, who turned 19-years-old recently. Callum enjoyed pushing the ice cake into the water and playing with it, before sharing it with his friends Jack and Bounty. Keepers always keep a watchful eye over the animals in extreme weather, but when it's hot they have other crafty ways of keeping the animals cool, such as sprinkler sessions, creating wet spots of sand and ensuring all of

the pools and mud wallows are topped up.

Eagle-eyed visitors to the wildlife attraction may spot the animals with their icy treats and are being urged to make sure they take care in this heat too by keeping hydrated and wearing sun cream. The animals can be seen on the Safari Drive or the Safari Walk areas of the Park, included in the admission price and guests can book in advance online for the best deals, which also includes a free return visit.

Public urged to think about use of water as situation worsens

WATER provider Severn Trent is urging its customers across the region to think carefully about their water use amidst this hot weather and hosepipe bans in

other areas of the country.

The West Midlands is now officially 'in drought' following the third heatwave of this summer and temperatures which have soared above 30°C in the region in the last

The National Drought Group (NDG) made the announcement on Tuesday as dry weather continued to impact water resources across England requiring water companies to take action to manage demand with the public being urged to use

with the public being urged to use water wisely.

Since the group last met on June 5, the situation has deteriorated, with further areas, including the West and East Midlands.

Across England, rainfall was 20 per cent less than the long-term

June was also the hottest on record for England, with two heatwaves driving unusually high demand for water.

Water levels dropping

Reservoir levels continue to fall with overall storage across England at 75.6 per cent - Yorkshire has seen its water levels drop to 53.8 per cent. This has seen its local water

company introduce a Temporary Use Ban (TUB) - commonly known as a 'hosepipe ban'. The National Drought Group

heard that - without further sub-stantial rain - some water compa-nies may need to implement further drought measures, including more Temporary Use Bans (TUBs) to conserve supplies.

The Environment Agency expects and will ensure that water compa-nies follow their drought management plans. Water companies need to step up their work to fix leaks and adjust their operations to conserve water.

We contacted water provider Severn Trent to ask if the West Midlands could be subject to water limits.

A spokesperson said: "Severn Trent hasn't had a hosepipe ban for over 30 years because we know just how important it is for our customers.

"It's why we have thousands of employees working around the clock right now to keep the water

clock right how to keep the water flowing.
"We're finding and fixing more leaks than ever before, investing record amounts in new pipes, and upgrading and developing new treatment works, adding hundreds of millions of litres of drinking water into our network.
"So, whilst we want to reassure

everything we can to keep the water flowing, we can't escape how hot and dry it is, and how little rainfall

"We experienced record levels of demand just last week and that's "So, whilst we want to reassure why, as well as doing everything we our customers that we're doing can, we're also asking our customers to be even more mindful of their water usage during this hot spell.

Think about water use

The public is being asked to think about how they use water at home as the less water they use at the

home, the more water there is for their local environment.

The National Drought Group is also asking recreational water users -such as anglers, swimmers and boaters to remain vigilant and report any environmental issues they see, such as fish in distress, acting as impor-

Farmers are using water efficiently, supporting one another, and looking to trade water and welcome the support from the Environment Agency.

However, without further rain, the agricultural community are facing a range of challenges due to the dry weather including concerns about irrigation reservoir levels.

It is likely yields will be lower than last year, particularly non-irrigated grains and straw.

Environment Agency teams are

out on the ground actively monitor-ing river levels, with staff working with the water sector to ensure there is enough water for the people and the environment.

Teams are also supporting farmers and abstractors with advice on how to manage abstraction dur-ing prolonged dry weather and low

Fisheries teams are responding where necessary to protect fish which are struggling due to reduced oxygen or moving them if the river has dried up and they have become stranded.



Workshop facilitator
Daisey Wallis said: "These
workshops are about more than fixing flat tyres. It's about demystifying bike mechanics, building selfreliance, and creating a space where women feel

able to handle their own repairs. Seeing participants confidently tackle prob lems on their own bike has been rewarding for me too as I was a complete novice until I started coming to the bike recycling work-shop about a year ago."

Danny Brothwell, chair of Bike Worcester, added: "Bike Worcester plans to host more women-focused and other inclusive work-shops in the future. The organisation welcomes donations of used bicycles or parts for future projects




