Youth group's shock as minibus is stolen

HEARTLESS thieves stole a Kidderminster youth club's minibus as the group was put-ting on its popular and packed summer programme.

Two raiders targeted the KDYT (Kidderminster and District Youth Trust) premises around 12.35am last

Wednesday.

The pair broke into the vehicle which was parked on the Youth Club car park on Bromsgrove Street. One drove it away and the vehicle's num-ber plates were found discarded in a near Tenbury but the minibus itself has not been seen since.

The minibus allowed the local youth charity to provide a range of trips and residentials to young people and the theft has meant it had to source a temporary replacement for this year's summer events. The packed programme sees young people visit-ing attractions and taking part in a

The provision is so popular the group filled both KDYT minibuses on every trip with waiting lists operating for more places.

KDYT works with young people from across Wyre Forest, providing mentoring, youth clubs, day trips and residential weekends and also joins up with a range of partner agencies to ensure young people get the support they need when they need it.

A total of 81 per cent of members come from the top 20 per cent most deprived areas of England, with 98 per cent of members joining KDYT on



the recommendation of their friends. Cat Bennett, KDYT's senior youth

worker, said: "The loss of the minibus is upsetting for young people and the

been able to borrow a minibus from Perdiswell Young People's Leisure Club which means we can deliver our

very popular summer programme.

"We have insurance but this is "We have insurance but this is a long process - another issue we are facing is the stolen minibus was in incredible condition with no rust and only 26,000miles on the clock - the insurance will only pay what a standard 2008 minibus is worth, the majority of these have high mileage, and have been well used with damage and lots of rust.

"We will not let the selfish actions of a few ruin things for young people, but we are facing a struggle to get a

bus as good as the one we lost."
KDYT has been on the Jeremy Vine Show on BBC Radio 2 to share its story, during a phone-in about the Ford Transit's 60th anniversary.

The Trust celebrates its own 60th anniversary in 2026 and describes

this as a 'cruel irony'.

Rapist sent to prison for 20 years

ARAPIST from Kidderminster has been jailed for 20 years after being found guilty of two counts of rape and sexual assaults.

Jose Martin Holden, 32, of George Street, Kidderminster, was sentenced at Worcester Crown Court on Friday, August 1.
Holden was handed a 20-year term plus five on licence for the first

count of rape, ten years for the second count of rape and eight years for assault of a female by penetration, along with two years for sexual assault. The three latter terms are to

run concurrently.

Restraining orders against both his victims were also put in place.

Holden was further ordered to sign the sex offenders' register and

to pay a victim surcharge of \$190. Det Sgt Poonam Parmar, from West Mercia Police CID, said: "We are pleased to get this lengthy prison term for Holden whose predatory sexual behaviour has caused so much harm to his victims

"We hope this conviction gives them the chance to move on in some respects of their lives and we have supported them fully during

the court and prosecution process.
"I would personally like to pay



tribute to their bravery in coming forward and reporting his disgust-ing actions and for working with us

"We hope this will encourage other victims of rape or sexual assault to come forward and speak to us.
"We will always listen to you, take

your concerns seriously and protect you from predators like Holden."



RESIDENTS in Stourport and visitors to the town are being urged to vote for their favourite boat design in a competition which runs at Tontine Gardens.

The Emily Jordan Foundation charity created the boats for Stourport Forward and they were then bought by businesses. schools and community organisations.

Participants were given free rein artistic licence to design their vessel on the theme of 'what Stourport meant to them'.

People can now vote for their favourite design between now and September 23 either in person on open days, using a voting slip and ballot box, or online.

Routine eye test at opticians helped save teen's sight

A ROUTINE eye test at Specsavers in Kidderminster ended up saving the sight of a teenager after a potentially serious neurological condi-

tion was spotted.

It began when 17-year-old Rebekah Chiad was taken for an eye test at the opticians in The Swan Centre after her mum Sarah noticed her daughter was struggling with

headaches and increased fatigue.

Despite it being only 14 months since Rebekah's last routine examination, they were seen by optometrist Christopher Robinson, who has been testing the family's eyes for years.

Sarah said: "We always love visiting Chris, he's a safe pair of hands and is so thorough.

"He's also so empathetic and understanding which really helped given the results of Rebekah's eye

During the examination, Chris spotted signs which concerned him and urgently referred Rebekah

for further investigation at Kidderminster Hospital.
Chris said: "Having seen Rebekah so recently, we were able to make a really clear comparison between

the pictures we had of her optic nerve from her last eye test and how it looked on the day.

"I could see an almost haze around the optic nerve and it also appeared raised in the images – this combined with her headaches and changes to her vision were enough

of a red flag for me to want her though of a red flag for me to want her to get checked out."

Within 20 minutes of arriving at the hospital, Rebekah was referred to the same-day doctor at Worcester Haenital Hospital.

They immediately did a CT scan and while Rebekah and Sarah we were sent home afterwards, they were told she likely had Idiopathic Intracranial Hypertension.

She had a lumbar puncture the

next morning, which confirmed the diagnosis.

Idiopathic Hypertension (IIH) is a condition where pressure inside the skull increases without an obvious

It can lead to vision loss if left untreated, making early detection critical.

Sarah said: "Rebekah is so much

better now.
"It was amazing how quickly the lumbar puncture got to work, the relief was almost instant.

"We were told she may have headaches or backache after the lumbar puncture, but luckily she hasn't had either.

"The fatigue has gone, she's back to college and her energy has returned which as her mum is so wonderful to see."
Sarah is now urging others to

'listen to their bodies and what their children are telling them'.

"When it's your own child, you really can't put a price on getting checked and being sure," she said. "Chris said he was just doing his job, but it meant so much more to

Chris added: "I'm so glad Rebekah came to see us when she did and that she feels more like her old self again.

"Being able to help people is an incredibly rewarding part of my job, spotting signs that can make a real difference to someone's life.

"Cases like this highlight the importance of getting your eyes checked if you notice any differ-

One Railway plan given the go-ahead

THE ONE Railway project will push the SVR towards the next stage of its ambitious restructure plans after members of the Severn Valley Railway Company Limited (SVRCL) voted in support of the plan.

The heritage railway announced the proposal last December after the pandemic and increased costs had left it in financial strain.

Under the restructure plans, two of the three legally separate entities that make up the SVR would be combined to form a charitable community benefit society.

In June, the shareholders of Severn Valley Railway (Holdings)

And, on Saturday, at the company's annual general meeting (AGM) at Kidderminster Railway Museum, members voted overwhelmingly in favour of the amalgamation.

It was a legal requirement for at least 50 per cent of votes cast to be in support for the resolution being passed.

The chairman of the SVRCL,
Diane Malyon, together with the
rest of the board of directors, recommended members support the
resolution.

She said: "I am extremely pleased

at the strength of support shown by our members for this second, important stage of the One Railway project and I would like to thank everyone for taking the time, either to attend the AGM or to vote online in advance.

"At each stage, members have examined the information presented to them, engaging with it and asking questions.

asking questions.
"Now they've given their mandate for the One Railway project to proceed, this is a terrific validation of the hard work that has been put into this project by a dedicated team of volunteers.

"The benefits and opportunity the One Railway project potentially brings to the SVR are hugely


Works began on Monday at the Astley end of the bridge and has progressed towards Stourport. Installation was carried out under temporary traffic lights, starting with three-way lights for two



Happy to follow a club where there are still so many memories to be made

Chris Oldnall has been follow-ing his home-town football club Kidderminster Harriers since the early 1960s and he has also been

early 1960s and he has also been chronicling their fluctuating fortunes for around 60 years. Here, Chris brings us his first taste of nostalgia on the Harriers in our new monthly feature 'Harriers Haritage' Heritage'.

FIFTY years ago David Beckham was born and football crazy Rod Stewart topped the charts with his classic hit single

'Sailing'.

And I could pop down the pub and buy a pint of beer for around 20p!

But that's not all - I also had the chance to boost Kidderminster Harriers' funds by purchasing their first ever Year Book, which I did loyally having been following the Harriers since the beginning of the previous decade.

In 1975 the club produced an

informative publication in a bid to 'bring itself to the public of

Kidderminster through something tangible and useful'.

And this week I unearthed my well preserved copy of this book which certainly brings back a lot of fond football memories from the 1970s.

The book kicks off with an introduction from the Aggborough-based then programme editor Jeff

Life-long supporter Baker wrote: "Aggborough has, for many inhabitants of this famous been the place to spend their Saturday afternoons, the place where the pent-up emotions of the working week have been let loose, the place where they can shout praise and abuse (within reason) at the play-ers and officials and then go home to their tea, happy or disconsolate according to the result."

Half a century on and nothing much seems to have changed as Harriers again do battle in another National League North campaign after missing out on promotion last season following a disappointing 2-1 play-off semi-final defeat at home to Chester.

When the Year Book was published the club were performing in the Southern League Division One North under the guidance of player-manager Stan Jones and his assistant Ron Whitehouse.

Opposition teams we then did bat-tle with included Redditch United. Cheltenham Town, Bedworth United, Merthyr Tydfil, AP Learnington, Banbury United, Bromsgrove Rovers, Barry Town, Stevenage Athletic, Bury Town, Wellingborough, King's Lynn,

Dunstable and Worcester City.

Aggborough chair at the time was Bill Greaves who penned a heartfelt foreword in the book which highlighted his beloved club's precarious financial position.

He wrote: "Unfortunately the general decline in public support for professional football, coupled with the problems created by national inflation, has hit the finances of the football club severely and it is only by organising fund raising projects such as this publication that we can hope to continue the service to which we

are all so dedicated.

"The existence of a successful professional football club plays an important part in the presentation of the town's image to which it is attached, and there can also be a number of by-products from which local industries and trades people may benefit."



Battling to save parts of town's hotel after devastating blaze

'KEY ELEMENTS of the original former Raven Hotel can be saved' - that was the view of Historic England which visited the site on Wednesday after the devastating fire which destroyed the building.

The blaze ripped through the centuries-old

structure on Sunday with fire crews spending hours overnight and into the next morning to extinguish the blaze

Two teenage girls, aged 13 and 14, were arrested on suspicion of arson and have since been released on bail.

been released on ball.

On Wednesday, Wychavon District Council
met at the site with representatives from Historic
England, structural engineers, building surveyors, Hereford and Worcester Fire and Rescue
Service and West Mercia Police. A representative for the former hotel also attended.

Wychavon has also commissioned its own structural engineer who is preparing a detailed report due to be completed shortly.

The immediate priority is to make the site safe which will involve fencing off the area to protect the public and the controlled demolition of those parts of the hotel that pose a safety risk. This will safeguard the historic elements which remain.

Some residents have asked why the council had not made a Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) for the site.
In response, the authority said CPOs could

only be used as a last resort, requiring a robust legal case which could take up to two years to

In this instance, the owner had planning permission granted three years ago and had publicly confirmed its intention to bring the site forward for development, including at the South Worcestershire Development Plan Examination earlier this year. This meant the legal threshold for a CPO was not met.

The building has always remained in private ownership and responsibility for its maintenance and security lies with the owner

Wychavon has monitored the Grade II listed building and issued the owner with a court order in November under Section 77 of the Building Act 1984 to make the site safe.

Work that was ordered to be done was due to be completed this month and the council will still recoup the cost of this work from the

Wychavon District Council leader, Coun Richard Morris, said the fire had been a 'deeply emotional moment' for the community.

"This building is woven into Droitwich's his-

and I know how many treasured memories are tied to it.

"To see it in this state is devastating, and I completely understand the sadness and frustration people are feeling – I feel it too."

He added the owner had committed to rede-

veloping the site and constantly reassured that commitment

"Our focus now is on protecting what can be saved, working hand-in-hand with the owners, Historic England, heritage bodies and our community to make sure the Raven's story continues in some form for future generations.

"I'm grateful to everyone who has been working tirelessly since the fire – your efforts mean

a great deal to our town."

As the structural and conservation assessments are finalised, Wychavon said it would continue to play an active role in discussions about the site's future.





Still time to get things growing

NATIONAL Allotment Week is here, with August being a great time for sowing and planting a wide variety of crops that will provide a fresh, nutrient-packed harvest well into the colder

months and early next year.

The t)eam at British Garden
Centres has put together this guide
to offer the perfect inspiration to plan and plant now for a kitchen garden that satisfies through late

autumn and winter.

Many gardeners think the growing season ends with summer, but the truth is the hopefully warmer August days offer a prime oppor-tunity to grow right through to the new year. When soil temperatures remain warm and daylight lingers, the cool weather crops flourish. By sowing or planting now, you can fill gaps where summer crops have finished and prepare your plot to burst more leaves, root vegetables, and pods as the weather cools.

What you can sow in August With the theme of this year's week being Allotments and Wellbeing, we've put together our top picks for nutritious but tasty crops you can grow for a healthier you.

Radishes are one of the quickest and easiest crops to sow during late summer. They thrive in well drained, fertile soil and produce

crisp, mildly peppery roots in just a few weeks. Radishes fit perfectly into tight spaces and mature rapidly, making them ideal for filling garden gaps, container planting and providing fresh crunch for autumn salads and snacks.

Spinach, especially hardy varieties like 'Superhero,' is another excellent choice to plant now. This leafy green is particularly resilient; it tolerates cooler temperatures and resists bolting, even when the weather turns chilly. Spinach is a great crop to grow for wellbeing as it provides a sustained supply of putritious groups to hydrother printer and the supply of putritions groups to hydrother printer and the supply of the suppl nutritious greens to brighten winter

Swiss chard, including varieties such as 'Apollo' and 'Celebration,' add splashes of colour to your autumn garden with its bright stems. Mustard greens and rocket offer more punchy, peppery flavours, bringing variety to your cold sea-son greens after being sown this August. Both crops respond well to late summer sowing and can be harvested repeatedly through cut-and-come-again methods, ensuring

Carrots are another staple, and varieties such as 'Autumn King 2' are perfect for late sowing and will develop sweet, dense roots over the coming months. salad through the colder months

Autumn onions and shallots can be started now to set a strong foundation for next season's bulbs, while containers or bags filled with seed potatoes like 'Charlotte' or 'Maris Peer' can be moved indoors before the frost for a festive Christmas

And don't forget garlic – varieties like 'Provence Wight, Carcassonne' & 'Provence' thrive when planted now and into autumn, establishing strong roots through the colder months for an early summer har-

Preparing your plot for National Allotment Week

To give your vegetables the best possible start, enrich your beds with possible start, enrich your beds with plenty of compost or organic matter, ensuring good drainage and a weed free seedbed. Spacing is important as overcrowding weakens plants and increases disease risk. Thin seedlings thoughtfully to encourage strong root and leaf development. Using protective coverings such as horticultural fleece, cloches, or netting will help shelter tender crops from early frosts, birds, slugs, and other pests. Regular watering during establishment is essential, but drop. Sowing these now, especial-avoid heavy, soggy soil, which may ly under protection like cloches or encourage rot.

How to be upfront when it comes to choosing who gets to sit where

SUMMER road trips are here, and so are the arguments.

New research has revealed the true scale of Britain's 'Shotgun' battle - and finally settled the official rules for that coveted front passenger seat.

Competition for the front passenger seat, often praised as the best spot in the car with its extra leg room and the opportunity to play DJ, can be tense.

A survey of 2,000 UK adults, commissioned by temporary car insurance provider Tempcover, found that one in four confess that disagreements over Shotgun rules have led to arguments on road trips.

Siblings are the most common opposition at the heart of this conflict. More shockingly, three in 10 have even had disputes with their own children over the front seat.

In a bid to help keep Britain's roads drama-free this summer, Tempcover has put the debate to rest, launching the Official Rules of Shotgun, backed by the research.

- 1. Anyone with a physical need overrules 'shotgun' (height, weight, bad back etc)
- 2. The driver has final say and can overrule 'shotgun'
- 3. The first person to call 'shotgun' gets the front seat

- 4. If two people call it at the same time, it's up to the driver to decide
- 5. 'Shotgun' only lasts for one leg of the journey. It starts again for the return trip
- 6. 'Shotgun' is final once called, you can't recall it
- 7. The 'shotgun' winner must be ready to leave at the driver's preferred time, otherwise 'shotgun' rights are withdrawn
- 8. You must be able to see the car to call 'shotgun'
- 9. 'Shotgun' resets once people get out of the car (e.g. if you stop at a service station and then continue the journey)
- 10. Calling 'shotgun' more than a certain time before a journey makes it invalid e.g. more than 24 hours before

According to the research, the highest priority for the front passenger seat should go to anyone with a physical need, such as being pregnant, tall or having a bad back.

The passenger with the longest legs was surprisingly named as one of the most worthy claimants

for trumping the Shotgun rules, alongside the oldest person on the journey.

Other rules to emerge from the study on why someone should bag

study on why someone should bag the front seat included anyone who calls Shotgun first bags the front seat, that Shotgun only lasts for one leg of the journey, and that you must be in view of the car when you make your claim.

It all comes down to the driver for some, with 12 per cent believing the

driver should be the ultimate tiebreaker, whilst one in 20 say a quiz question should decide the winner. To weigh in on the Shotgun

To weigh in on the Shotgun debate, Tempcover has partnered with JB Gill, member of British boyband JLS, as he recalls his days on the road with the band ahead of their upcoming tour.

JB, who is encouraging Brits to use the official Shotgun rules to avoid any potential car squabbles, said: "Calling shotgun before a car journey has sparked friendly competition over who gets to ride in the highly prized front seat for generations! "Ever since I first started

"Ever since I first started driving, the front seat was always the one that every passenger wanted and as you can imagine, it's led to many heated debates.

"Every driver has their own shotgun rules, so having official rules thanks to Tempcover means there's now a neutral way to make the decision and - hopefully - help the journey start smoothly from the off."






