Charity recognition for battle on blood cancer

THE OWNERS of the Bodenham Arboretum near Kidderminster have been recognised by Blood Cancer UK after supporting the cause continuously for 20 years.

James and Wendy Binnian say they have seen what progress in blood cancer means and their commitment to research is a deeply personal one.

For local visitors and tourists, the arboretum is a tranguil, 170-acre woodland, including lakes and rare

But, many may not know that when Wendy was just 16 and her brother Andy was 15, they lost their mother Andy was 15, they lost them mother to an aggressive form of blood cancer - acute myeloid leukaemia (AML) - in the 1970s.

This was at a time when treatment options were limited and research

was still in its infancy.
Years later, in 1988, James's younger brother Ryland was diagnosed with chronic myeloid leukae-

mia (CML).

James donated his own bone marrow in an attempt to save his brother's life. Sadly, his brother died in 1989.

Thanks to advances in research, treatments have come a long way and survival rates are improving But blood cancer is still the UK's third biggest cancer killer.

And since the early 1990s, following the loss of James's brother, the Binnian family has raised more than \$20,000 for Blood Cancer UK.

Their efforts include several memorable 'band in the barn' fundraisers, regular coffee mornings

a popular ongoing secondhand book sale at the Arboretum, which have brought communities together in support of life-saving research.

Wendy said: "We've lost people we loved – and that will always stay with us.
"But we've also seen what prog-

ress in blood cancer research means.

"It's research that's given people

time and hopefully a cure.
"That's why we do what we do – so that one day, no one will have to

go through what we did. Rachel Mann Bradbury, from Blood Cancer UK, said: "We

are deeply moved by James and Wendy's enduring commitment to our cause.
"Both Wendy and James know

what blood cancer takes and their tireless fundraising efforts have made a significant impact in advancing research and supporting those affected by blood cancer.

Pete's Maypole Piece poem is brought to life in poignant film

A NEW poem and video have been launched as part of the campaign to save a much-loved piece of historic land in Wribbenhall, Bewdley.

Maypole Piece was put up for sale in June and, with fears it could be developed for housing, a campaign was launched in a bid to buy it for the community.

He then took the views of people that had been given to the Friends group and created 'We are the Land' from them.

It contains the words: 'Land is always worth a stand' and: 'Let us bring back the innocence and joy for all in a place that overlooks all we

The poem also mentions the sports played on the land, going back to a time where peo-ple 'connected and talked' and the community and legacy it wants to leave.

Pavilion demolished in £3m park revamp

THE SONS of Rest Pavilion in Brinton Park is being demolished, with plans for a new community space, complete with cafe and outside terrace being put forward as its replacement.

The move – the latest stage of

revamping the popular park - comes after the historic pavilion was damaged beyond repair by badgers liv-

ing in the park.

The new building will also be done sensitively to reflect the heritage of the original building which was constructed in 1938.

This is just one of many improve-

ments being made by Wyre Forest District Council's programme tak-ing place over the next 12 months. The demolition began last week

with the park badgers, which caused the damage, being rehomed to an artificial sett elsewhere in the park.

Contractor McPhillips (Wellington) Ltd will deliver the rear-\$3million improvement programme, made possible due to \$2.4million's worth of funding from The National Lottery Heritage

Stuart Mackenzie, director of McPhillips Ltd, said: "We're excited to get started on this phase of works at Brinton Park, which will ultimately deliver a vibrant and modern space for the whole com-

"And while it is sad that original Sons of Rest Pavilion could not be saved, we're confident that Wyre

Forest District Council's vision will ensure that the park's heritage is preserved for years to come."

The Sons of Rest planning appli-

cation is to be determined at the council's planning meeting this October.
Coun Tracey Onslow, Wyre Forest

District Council's Cabinet Member for Culture, Leisure and Arts and Community Safety, added: "Over the next 12 months, the park will see significant visual and practical improvements.
"The Sons of Rest project is now

in progress, as is the digging out of the new ornamental pool which will be located where the original paddling pool was. Further work in the extensive improvement programme includes refurbishment of the existing toilet block, improvements to



Carer support work praised

EFFORTS from Worcestershire County Council to support unpaid carers across the county have been praised by the Social Care Institute for Excellence (SCIE).

The council has developed a pioneering project focused on better supporting unpaid carers when the people they care for are discharged from hospital

discharged from hospital.

Alongside Worcestershire Association of Carers, Herefordshire and Worcestershire ICB, and Taking Care Ltd, the council is using assistive technology to ensure carers are able to access vital information and support at the point of hospital discharge.

Kathryn Marsden OBE, chief executive

Kathryn Marsden OBE, chief executive of Social Care Institute for Excellence said: "Worcestershire's work in this area stands out as a strong example of how local systems can take practical steps toward transformation, particularly when those with lived experience are meaningfully engaged."

rience are meaningfully engaged."

The aim of the project is to provide carers with relevant information, signposting, support, access to assessments and assistive technology so they are able to access the right services if and when they need them.

The project was initially trialled at Evesham Hospital's Stroke Ward and is now expanding to other sites. Efforts are also ensuring carers have access to assistive technology that can support people at home

that can support people at home.
Assistive technology has enabled carers to continue working alongside their caring role, as well as allowing carers to take time away from caring to have a meaningful break, offering them peace of mind when they are not at home and a chance to maintain their own wellbeing.

The Social Care Institute for Excellence also highlighted the joined up working approach across social care, health, local authority, voluntary sector, and how technology has made the project more meaningful and sustainable.

Councillor Susan Eacock, cabinet member with responsibility for adult social care at Worcestershire County Council said: "Unpaid carers make an extraordinary contribution every day—often with little recognition and limited support. This project demonstrates how practical collaboration, and new approaches can make a real difference."

The Council was awarded over \$500,000 from the Department of Health and Social Care's Accelerating Reform Fund (ARF) in April 2024 to lead innovative work designed to improve adult social care across the region

Karen Edwards, CEO of Worcestershire Association of Carers added: "The partnership working across the systems in Worcestershire and the commitment to improving the experience of hospital discharge for Carers has really been key to the success of the ARF Programme, as well as the valuable insight and experience of unpaid Carers which is essential to the innovation and transformation within social care."

In addition, a countywide volunteering portal and a new network of 'information first aiders' are helping to create a stronger, more connected support system.

more connected support system.

In recognition of their success, Worcestershire Association of Carers was recently invited to SCIE's Coproduction Week Conference and at a Parliamentary Reception at Westminster.

Keep your eyes on the cricket

THE UK'S largest cricket has been spotted in Worcestershire and staff from a local charity are urging people to report any sightings they have.

The Great green bush crickets can grow up to 7cm (2.7ins) in length which makes them one of the largest insects in the country.

The species are usually found in the south and east but around 10 years ago, a great green bush cricket was found in the far south of Worcestershire.

Despite that, experts have not been able to find anymore in the county - until now.

In spring, a nymph (a young cricket) was discovered in the

Sighting of rare visitor prompts call to report spottings

north of the county.

It takes a minimum of two years for the crickets to develop from the

egg to becoming an adult.

This means the egg would have been laid in 2023 or earlier.

Staff at Worcestershire Wildlife

Trust would like to know whether this means the species is present elsewhere in the county. Wendy Carter from

Worcestershire Wildlife Trust said "I've had the pleasure of seeing these crickets in Suffolk before, so the idea that they might be living right here in Worcestershire

is very exciting. They particularly like hanging out in tall vegetation, from meadows and hedgerows to gardens and allotments

"It's so intriguing that one was found in the south of the county 10 years ago and now we have nymphs in the north of Worcestershire

Where else might they be?

Spotting them

According to the trust, the Great green bush crickets are unmistak-able - in size, they are more like a grasshopper or a crickets that

might be found abroad. Wendy added: "This makes it much easier to know when you've found one and we'd love to hear from anyone who does

Adults are large and green with very long wings, a brown stripe running along the back and very long antennae.

Females have a long egg-laying organ, called an ovipositor, at the end of their body that they use to lay their eggs into soil.

Readers may hear the males 'singing' to the females, which they do by rubbing their wings together

to create a long loud whirring

"They can be frustratingly difficult to spot - their colouring pro-vides perfect camouflage as they hunt through the vegetation looking for flies, caterpillars and other insects to eat."

The team at Worcestershire
Wildlife Trust is encouraging residents to help them put more dots on the map to help them understand whether these giants of the cricket world are here to stay.



More police roles to go in war on costs

FURTHER police staff roles are set to be cut across West Mercia as the force continues to battle fund-

ing shortfalls.

Just months ago, in June, after the force announced redundancies in non-policing staff roles which have made 'significant savings', West Mercia says its \$8 million budget gap 'must be addressed'.

West Mercia's PCC, John Campion, and chief constable, Richard Cooper, broke the news to their workforce last Thursday (August 14) but have not confirmed how many roles will be

The pair said Government funding is not keeping pace with inflation and a growing demand on its services.

An underestimation of its costs, alongside a recent pay deal for offic-ers, an uplift in policing numbers and those reaching higher pay points, continues to put strain on the organi-

sation's budgets.
Whilst the Police and Crime
Commissioner, along with other PCCs
and Chiefs around the country, has reached out to the Home Office to stress the financial strain in policing in general, they say this isn't a solution for this current situation. The Home Office has not responded publicly to calls from forces across the UK.

Chief Constable Richard Cooper said: "The difficult decision we have made, to make further police staff redundancies, is certainly not some-thing we would choose to be doing.

"Protecting people from harm remains our absolute priority. We absolutely stand by our commitment to the neighbourhood policing guar-

Mr Campion said: "I want to reassure our communities that action is being taken to address these issues and ensure that the force is able to continue delivering an efficient and effective service and keep communities safe.

"The Chief Constable and I are making best use of all the resources and flexibilities we have at our disposal.

But it is not enough.

"Let's be clear. There are wider, fundamental issues around how central funding is distributed to police forces that hasn't been fixed by the current, or previous, Governments.

"This unfairness, that I have raised on a number of occasions, has exacer-

bated the current challenges we face.
"In addition, there are growing mandates from the Government dictating how we should spend the grant we receive for our police force, communities and their needs.

Advice is to extend Child Benefit claim soon

PARENTS who know their teenager's plans in September are being urged to extend their claim now to continue to receive Child Benefit.

HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) has written to 1.5 million eligible parents reminding them to extend their Child Benefit claim for their 16 to 19-year-old.

Child Benefit is worth \$26.05 per week - or \$1,354.60 a year - for the eldest or only child and

£17.25 per week - or £897 a year for each additional child.

Child Benefit can continue to

be paid for young people who are studying full time in non-advanced education as well as unpaid approved training courses.

More than 509,000 parents teenagers, who are staying in full-time education or approved trainhave already extended their Child Benefit claim.

A record-breaking 67 per cent have done it online to guarantee their payments will continue in September. Parents need to extend their claim by 31 August or payments will automatically stop.

Myrtle Lloyd, HMRC's chief cus-

tomer officer, said: "Teenagers can be expensive and Child Benefit is an important source of income for your household. As soon as you know what your teen is doing in September, don't miss out. You can extend your claim in minutes through the HMRC app or online to

If either the claimant or their partner has an individual income of between \$60,000 and \$80,000, the higher earner will be subject to the High Income Child Benefit Charge.

For families who fall into this category, the online Child Benefit tax calculator provides an estimate of how much benefit they will receive and what the charge may be.

HMRC say the quickest and easiest way to ensure payments con-tinue is to extend via the HMRC app or online through the digital

Parents can also scan the QR code in their reminder letter which will take them straight to the digital service.



Gardening

Making the most of the water we have

ADVICE has been offered for gardeners wanting to keep their plots looking lush despite the lack of rain the UK has endured over the past weeks and months.

The increased sunshine and temperatures, along with four UK heat-waves already this year, has meant areas across the country are dry and usually green areas are looking drab.

Add to that water shortages and
although not in our region - hosepipe bans, keeping gardens looking fantastic can be a challenge.

Use watering cans or buckets - The simplest and most effective method of watering gardens is using a watering can or bucket. Filling items from a mains tap is permitted and provides an albeit low tech effective solution. It also makes it easier to control where the water goes so people can prioritise plants that really suffer in dry conditions. Among these are plants growing in containers, newly planted species and pod and fruit-producing vegetables. Flowers, such as sweet peas and dhalias also benefit. Do not worry about brown lawns - the green colour return when the rain does fall.



Reuse greywater - Whilst watering cans can be effective to really conserve water, it is a good idea to make use of recycled water instead of going straight for the mains supply. 'Grey' household water from washing up, baths or laundry can be reused outdoors. It is important not to use it on vegetables and other edible plants, but it is a fantastic option for carring for your lawn and other plants. After washing dishes,

use leftover water for ornamental or garden beds - make sure it is free of strong chemicals, such as bleach or strong detergents as these will damage your plants.

Harvest rainwater with water butts - This takes pre-planning as droughts are not often forecast but if you get one installed, it can prevent future hosepipe bans. Rainwater is great for plants as it is softer and contains fewer salts and chemicals than tap water. Install a water but or rain barrel under a downpipe for free soft rainwater that can then be distributed to plants.

Using a watering can gives

more control and makes it

easier to target individual

plants most in need. s

Set up a drip irrigation system-Some limited hose use is still allowed, for example, many water companies will permit watering recently planted trees and shrubs or vegetable plots, even during a ban. Automated drip or trickle irrigation systems can also run if they meet certain conditions - the system must be fitted with a pressure-reducing valve and timer and not be handheld. The system must place water drip by drip onto soil services or beneath and must not disperse it through the air, using a jet or mist.

Mulch to lock in moisture - Plants in containers and those planted directly in the ground will need extra care during dry spells because they lose moisture quickly. Container plants dry out faster because of roots being confined, but ground plants can also suffer if the soil gets too dry. Add a layer of mulch - such as bark chips, shredded leaves or gravel - around plants to keep moisture locked in, keep the soil cooler and reduce evaporation.

Water at the right time -Always water early in the morning or late in the evening to prevent losing it to evaporation. This will ensure the maximum benefit to plants. Water deeply, not frequently - a good soak gives plants a better chance at absorbing it.

Gardens do not have to suffer in drought, there are plenty of ways to keep them hydrated without relying on a hose. This ensures gardens thrive - even in a heatwaye.







The Motor Ombudsman's Bill Fennell said: "Doing your homework lays the foundations to make the right decision when heading to the showroom.

Deciding on the type of car that will work for your commute, social commitments, and your lifestyle,

needs thorough research. Read reviews, speak to others, and buy a car at a reputable and trusted retailer (https:// businesses.the-motorombuds-

man.org).
If you're thinking of opting for pure battery power, there's government grant offering up to \$3,750 off the

price of eligible EV makes and models. Some carmakers also have their own discounts and incentives.

Having the very latest and accurate information on hand to make that all-important decision is essential. Bill says: "It's important to make sure that any websites referred to have up-to-date details, as some articles and sources of data can sometimes be written a while

back."

"The cost of ownership can add up quickly, so have a realistic picture from the outset", says Bill.

Before leaving the retailer, have a look around to ensure the car is in perfect condition inside and out, that all the documentation is present (including the car's handbook), that any optional extras and accessories you ordered with the car are there and it's already charged up if it's an EV. You should also get a show around by the retailer so that you're comfortable with the controls and in-car tech.
