Harriers sack Brown after promotion pain

Axe falls on boss as home play-off loss ends hopes

KIDDERMINSTER Harriers have parted company with manag-er Phil Brown following the club's failure to achieve promotion from National League North.

Harriers confirmed the departure of Brown and his assistant Neil McDonald with immediate effect.

Kidderminster 2-1 against Chester at Aggborough in the play-off semi-finals on Sunday in what proved to be Brown's final

game in charge of the club.

That came after Harriers failed to win the title and promotion on the final day of the season following a shock 2-1 defeat at Southport when they had started the day as

league leaders.
The club have already begun the process of appointing Brown's successor.

Harriers chairman Richard Lane said: "Whilst we came close to achieving our goal, the outcome of the season ultimately proved bitterly disappointing.
"We remain firmly focused

on our primary objective for the club, which is returning to the National League. We feel now is the right time to make changes before embarking our future campaign.

"I would personally like to thank both Phil and Neil for their efforts during their time with Kidderminster Harriers and we wish them nothing but the best for the future and their next challenge.

"The process of appointing new manager is already under way and we hope to update our loyal supporters

on that soon."

Former Hull City and Bolton Wanderers manager Brown became Harriers boss January 2024 with the club bottom of the National League table.

He initially signed a deal until the end of the season and won six of his first eight matches in charge but was unable to prevent the club from suffering relegation.

The 65-year-old signed a new two-year deal to remain at Aggborough following the game of the 2023/24 campaign.

And Brown looked set to return Harriers to the National League at the first attempt after the club embarked on a 13-game unbeaten run at the end of the season. However, Kidderminster

lost at Southport on the final



day of the season which allowed Brackley Town to clinch the title and promo-

Harriers then entered the play-offs and had home advantage against Chester in the semi-final, only to surrender an early lead in a narrow 2-1 defeat.





Reform take control of county council

THE WYRE Forest divisions in the Worcestershire County Council elections were dominated by Reform UK which took eight of the ten seats.

Only two Conservatives – Chaddesley stalwart and Wyre Forest Disrtrict Council leader, Coun Marcus Hart, and Bewdley's Dan Morehead – managed to hold onto their seats.

The voter turn-out averaged 33.6 per cent of those eligible to vote across the Wyre Forest District. The highest turn-out was in Bewdley – at 40.1 per cent – and the lowest was 26.5 per cent in St George's.

20.5 per cent in St George S.
Coun Hart told the Standard: "I'm
mightily relieved – it has been a
relentless campaign.
"I have worked tirelessly for the
people of Chaddesley for over eight
years and I want to thank every sindle person who yethed for me." gle person who voted for me.

By the end of the count, Worcestershire's make-up mirrored many other councils being contest-ed last week across England.

One of the new Reform UK councillors, Rob Wharton (St Peter's) said he got into politics as he wanted to 'make daily life better for people'. He added one of the issues which would be top of his agenda would be potholes.

On the success of Reform UK,

he added he felt many people felt like they had not been listened to for years and wanted their voices to be heard.

The results meant the Conservatives lost control of Worcestershire County Council for the first time in decades.

Reform UK now has 27 seats on the new-look council, the Conservatives have 12, The Green Party has eight councillors, the Liberal Democrats six, Labour two and they are the independent. and there are two independents.

Caught over crypto crin

A MAN has been handed a suspended sentence he stole and gambled away more than £150,000 in cryptoassets in what is the first ever conviction relating to cryptocurrency in West Mercia Police.

Ben Noden, 38, from Shipston-on-Stour, Warwickshire, was sen-tenced at Worcester Crown Court on Wednesday he previously pleaded guilty to two counts of theft by employee and fraud by false repre-sentation. The offences took place in Kidderminstter.

Noden was handed a 24-month sentence, suspended for 24 months for theft by employee, 12 months suspended for 24 months for fraud by false representation and eight months suspended for 24 months for theft other, including theft by finding.

The sentences will rund concurrently, meaning the overall sentence is 24 months, suspended for 14 months.

The sentence comes after a cryp toasset tracing investigation against Noden was launched in 2022.

The investigation, the first of its kind by West Mercia Police, found Noden had stolen \$150,000 which had been invested into cryptoassets

Cryptoassets or cryptocurrencies are an alternative way of storing value, with transfers and payments occurring through a peer-to-peer system.

It means users can send and receive the 'cash' directly without an intermediary such as a bank.

The complex investigation, led by

the Kidderminster-based Reactive CID, was supported by Det Con Dave Allen from West Mercia Police's Cyber Crime Unit who carried out extensive and meticulous analysis across 90 different cryptoassets across multiple blockchain

investigation also found Noden had made 11 transactions to his own personal account, stealing approximately £3,000 in cash.

No cryptoassets were seized by

the police as Noden had used all the assets to fund a gambling habit.

assets to fund a gambing mable.

Det Ch Insp Matt Mcnelis, who leads the Cyber Crime Unit, said: "This case marks West Mercia Police's first successful cryptoasset tracing investigation to reach court and demonstrates the complexity of such investigations and importantly how cryptoassets analysis can sup port other departments in securing positive outcomes for victims.

"I would like to commend the work of Detective Constable Dave Allen in his determination in a complex investigation to secure this successful outcome at court.



Funding will mean more officers in key roles

A MULTI-MILLION pound funding boost will allow West Mercia Police to hire dozens of new officers into neighbourhood roles over the next

year.

Government funding of \$3 million will cover the hiring of 31 neighbourhood police officers as well as 20 PCSOs and 15 specials across West Mercia.

Earlier this month, Home Secretary Yvette Cooper announced details of funding for 2025/26 as the start of a four-year Neighbourhood Policing Guarantee programme to bring in 13,000 extra officers by the end of Labour's parliament.

Each force in England and Wales

Each force in England and Wales has been allocated a budget based on the Police Funding Formula with West Mercia Police receiving \$3,108,283, in line with neighbouring Staffordshire's allocation of £3,014,459.

Speaking on behalf of West Mercia Police Federation, Steve Butler said: "We welcome the Government's plans to boost neighbourhood policing, an area that was severely hit by the budget cuts introduced from 2010 with the et cuts introduced from 2010, with the

links into our communities being hard hit and public confidence in policing being dented.

"It is vital we rebuild neighbourhood

policing and this investment should help get us back on track by putting officers back into the hearts of our communities

As part of the Government's plans. it wants every neighbourhood in England and Wales to have dedicated teams spending their time on the beat, with guaranteed police patrols in town cen-tres and other hotspot areas at peak times such as Friday and Saturday nights.

In announcing the funding, Ms Cooper said: "The heartbeat of our Great British policing tradition is see-ing bobbies on the beat, but for too long, too many communities have been feeling abandoned as crime soared and neighbourhood police disappeared. "That's why this Government is determined to get police back on the

beat and into our town centres.

"It should not matter where you live – everyone deserves local, visible policing they can trust."





The Circle of Care: How Support Travels Through a Community

Care has a quiet momentum. It doesn't shout. It doesn't seek credit. But when one person chooses to help another, something remarkable happens - it spreads.

Welcome to the Circle of Care: an invisible, ever-turning wheel powered by acts of kindness, big and small. In towns, villages, and cities across the country, people are stepping up for each other - and in doing so, sparking a chain reaction of compassion.

It often starts with something simple. A hot meal left on a doorstep. A schoolchild giving up their seat on the bus. A stranger paying for the coffee of the person behind them in the queue. These gestures might feel fleeting to the giver, but to the person on the receiving





end, they can be transformative. Not just for what they provide - but for what they inspire. Take the story of a local couple who began cooking extra portions of their evening meals and delivering them to an elderly neighbour

during lockdown. That neighbour, once isolated, began knitting hats and scarves for a women's shelter in return. The shelter staff, moved by the gesture, started offering monthly pop-ups with free toiletries for the homeless.

And volunteers at those events? Some were recipients of care themselves, now giving back in kind.

This is the Circle of Care in motion. It grows not by obligation, but by invitation. It says: You've helped me – I want to help someone else.

At the heart of this cycle is connection. Care doesn't exist in a vacuum. When we see someone doing good, we're often reminded of our own power to contribute. It's why communities respond so passionately to fundraising pages, food drives, or community clean-up days. They aren't just supporting a cause – they're continuing a story. And it's not always the obvious moments that carry the most weight. A listening ear. A ride to a doctor's appointment. Watching a neighbour's child for an hour so they can rest. These are small acts – but they build trust, dignity, and belonging. They lay the foundation





for a community where people feel safe to both give and receive care. In schools, children are learning this too. Many are now taking part in kindness challenges – writing positive notes for classmates, helping with litter picks, or raising funds for local charities. Teachers report that once a culture of kindness takes hold, it becomes self-sustaining. "One child brings in a tin for the food bank, and suddenly the whole class is donating," said one headteacher. "They inspire each other."

Businesses are joining the circle as well. A bakery offering leftover loaves to a shelter.

A taxi firm giving discounted rides to cancer patients. A florist donating unsold blooms to a hospice. These aren't marketing stunts – they're reflections of what it means to be rooted in community.

But the beauty of the Circle of Care is that you don't need to wait for permission to enter it. You only need to ask: What can I do, right now, with what I have? And that answer will look different for everyone. For some, it's time. For others, it's resources. For many, it's simply attention – noticing when someone is struggling and showing up.

Even digital communities are catching on.

Local Facebook groups often help this local newspaper and help act as the new town square – offering everything from babysitting swaps to urgent appeals for missing pets. Behind each post is a person reaching out, and another person reaching back.

And when care flows in a circle, no one is left behind. Those who give today may need help tomorrow. Those who receive today may be the first to offer it next time. It's not a straight line. It's a cycle. A rhythm. A shared responsibility.

So if you've ever wondered whether a small act of kindness really makes a difference – know this: it does. Not just to the person you helped, but to the person they go on to help. And the one after that. And the one after that. Because care is contagious. And once it's set in motion, it rarely stops.

Let's keep it turning.



The show itself was three episodes from Black Adder II – oneand-a-half either side of an inter-



Although Michio Suzuki had first started in business much earlier than that in March 1920 with the manufacture of textile looms.

These became more advanced in design and very popular right through to the early 1950's when there was a global decline in the cotton industry; Suzuki then decided to diversify into motorised transport with introduction of its first motorcycle in 1953 and the first car followed two years later.

lowed two years later.

Initial research and development of Suzulight began as far back as 1937 although this had to be shelved later with the outbreak of the second World War. This development finally resumed in 1954 when Suzuki Motor Co Limited was formed.

Using Suzuki's 'Yaramaika' spirit, (translated as 'Let's do it') which was deep in the root of the Enshu region where Suzuki originated together with his determination to drive forward, Michio Suzuki quickly began

researching vehicles produced overseas and gained a wealth of knowledge.

Suzulight was a compact vehicle measuring

Suzulight was a compact vehicle measuring less than three metres in length and weighing just over 500kg. It was powered by a 360cc, 15PS two cylinder, two-stroke engine which was the first of its type to ever be fitted to

It was also the first car in Japan to feature a Front Wheel Drive / Front engine layout and was way ahead of its time with its independent coil spring suspension and rack and pinion steering

pendent con spring suspension and superpinion steering.
Suzulight easily met the Japanese 'Keijidosha' or Kei light car legislation and Suzuki and his team quickly began their first development road testing of it.

As a prototype, its most memorable early drive was a 300km trip across the Hakone mountainous region between Hamamatsu and Tokyo which proved very challenging on roads that had not yet been paved.

Although arriving very late in the evening, the team arrived to present the car to the President of 'Yanase Auto' Japan's leading authority on Automobiles.

The President had stayed on late to greet the team and made his way out to thoroughly test the car.

Several hours later he returned very impressed and immediately gave Suzuki full

approval to put the Suzulight into production.

Production commenced in October 1955 with initial production of 3-4 cars per month but by early 1956 monthly volume had climbed to 30 units.

70 years on, Suzuki Motor Corporation remains globally renowned as the 'small car experts' and produces well over three million

units per year with a projection of four million units annually by 2030.

Brown slams players in final interview as Harriers boss

FOOTBALL: PHIL Brown claimed the Kidderminster Harriers players 'could not handle the pressure' of the play-offs in his last interview as Harriers

Kidderminster lost 2-1 against Chester at Aggborough in the National League North play-off semi-finals in what proved to be the 65-year-old's final game at the helm.

The club parted company with Brown just days after the Chester defeat as Harriers failed to achieve promotion despite sitting top of the table on the final day of the season.

And Brown questioned the men-tality of his players following the

play-off semi-final defeat against

Brown said: "There's highs and lows and there's a winner and a loser and unfortunately we've been on the losing end of two poor performances from us. "Chester were resilient, well-or-

ganised, well versed to change and better than us at second balls which is something I find hard to believe

"You can praise the opposition but you've got to give criticism to your own - myself included.
"The criticism comes in the way of

being able to handle yourself on the bigger stage and it's always the last

game of the season.

"We haven't stepped up to the plate, we haven't been able to handle the pressure.
"If you don't step up to the plate

in these moments, then you're never

going to step up to the plate and that's what has happened in the last couple of games.

There are no words of wisdom, we have to understand why we lost the game. When the pressure was cranked up, we didn't respond.

"We were responsible for getting it to the last game of the season but to not conduct yourself in the manner

you have done is unacceptable."

"To have players that can't handle pressure is something I have to look at deeply with regards to next

Brown appeared to suggest he was willing to remain with Harriers next season when quizzed about his future.

The now former Harriers boss had 12 months left on his contract before he and the club parted ways.

Speaking after the Chester defeat, Brown added: "I don't believe in the contract situation, as far as I'm concerned my record speaks for itself.

"At this level, it's understandable, it's totally different, I must admit I

really have enjoyed it.
"But these moments are the ones you have to understand what it takes to win a game of football and get it over the line and win promotion.

"The bottom line is, you've got to judge players when push comes to

"We started pushing and shoving in the last 12 to 14 games.
"But when push comes to shove it

Play-off heartbreak for Kiddy against Chester

KIDDERMINSTER Harriers suffered a heartbreaking 2-1 defeat to Chester in their National League North play-off semi-final, writes Neil Gordon.

Harriers took an early lead through Kyle Morrison's opener at Aggborough but it was not enough to see them through to the final against Scunthorpe United, and the Reds will again be playing National League North football next season.

For Chester, Dylan Mottley-Henry grabbed a first-half equaliser and Declan Weeks scored a stunning late winner, after Kurt Willoughby's penalty had been brilliantly saved by Harriers

goalkeeper Christian Dibble.
A crowd of 4,647 watched Phil
Brown's men fall to defeat for the second game running after their agonising 2-1 loss at Southport, which denied them the title and automatic promotion back to the National League.

Morrison gave Kidderminster the lead when he steered home from pointblank range at the back post from a corner to send Aggborough wild after 18 minutes.

Zak Brown could have given the hosts an earlier lead but his left foot shot whizzed past the Chester bar with just three minutes on the clock.

The visitors equalised with their first real sight of goal when Mottley-Henry swept home a loose ball after Harriers goalkeeper Dibble had palmed away a

long-range Connor Woods shot. Both sides had chances to go in

front in the closing stages of the first-half with Chester's Willoughby striding down the left and firing past the near post, while Harriers Maz Kouhyar found himself in front of goal but unable to finish.

After the interval, Harriers were put to the test by a transformed Chester side that started the second-half look-

ing to get the job done.

The visitors had a glorious chance to take the lead from the penalty spot after Morrison fouled Iwan Murray inside the box, but Dibble superbly beat away Willoughby's fierce spot

On the hour mark Kidderminster's leading hitman Ashley Hemmings shot wide as both teams went for goal and treated the supporters to a thrilling passage of play.

Harriers survived a scare on 77

minutes when Chester substitute Dan Mooney went through and knocked the ball past the outrushing Dibble, but he over hit it and the ball went out.

And just four minutes later the visi-

tors booked their place in the play-off final when Weeks sent a glorious curling shot inside the back post from the edge of the box, to send the Chester contingent wild.

Despite 10 minutes of stoppage time Harriers were unable to find an equaliser and force extra time, and the game, and the season, ended for Kidderminster with the players falling to the ground heartbroken in defeat.
