Joy as rare rhino is born at safari park

A RARE rhinoceros calf has been born at the West Midlands Safari Park in Bewdley.

The female baby is only the second successful Indian rhino birth at the park in its 52-year history, following the calf's half-brother who arrived in 2020.

birth to first time mum Sunanda took place last week under the watchful eye of the keepers who said mum and baby were both doing really well.

The labour did not initially go to plan and staff had to step in to lend a helping hand.

Veterinary nurse, Sarah Smith, said, "The wildlife and veterinary teams are well-rehearsed with rhino births, but each birth presents its own journey.

"Sunanda didn't follow all of the usual steps during the weeks leading up to the birth, but our experienced were able to spot the initial signs of labour during the night.

A long, restless night monitor-ing CCTV and morning checks confirmed labour was progressing but then, closer inspection showed back feet visible, meaning it would be an 'abnormal delivery'.

Breech births present many difficulties - research shows a large number require intervention and usually end in calf mortality. They can also endanger the mum's life so staff knew they only had a short time window to act.

"We were able to apply calving ropes to the calf's hind legs and assist Sunny with her contractions and help birth the calf.

Expecting the worst outcome, staff were busy fighting to save Sunanda and were delighted to see the calf was

alive and moving.

"Sunanda is showing the initial signs of being a perfect new mum, despite the difficulty she had just faced, and is continuing to raise her first salf in terrtheal's feetiers. first calf in textbook fashion.

"We're so proud of her and the team.

Moving forward

After such a traumatic entrance into the world, staff said they were taking each day as it comes.

Both mum and calf may have access to the outside paddock when the weather is suitable so visitors over the next few weeks could catch a climpse of them.

The plan is to mix them both with Seto - the other female rhino - in the near future.

The baby girl is yet to be named, but keepers will pick a name begin-



The calf brings the number of Indian rhinos at the Park up to four, which includes mum, Sunanda, female Seto and male, 17-year-old Rap, who is father to the youngster.

Indian rhino, aka the greater one-horned rhino, are classed as 'vulnerable' to extinction by the IUCN (International Union for the Conservation of Nature), so every birth is a boost to the species' conservation and survival.

The Indian rhinos are part of an EEP (EAZA Ex-situ Programme), a collaboration of European wildlife parks to work together to help pre-serve endangered species.

West Midlands Safari Park sup-ports and donates annually to Save the Rhino International which work to protect all five types of rhinos in

Kate raises a glass as tropical garden is choice of the people

KIDDERMINSTER garden designer Kate Mason 'is both exhausted and elated' after achieving her long-held dream of creating her first show garden at this year's RHS Malvern Spring Festival.

And the green-fingered creator was awarded a silver-gilt medal.

Her tropical-style show garden, The Hierarchy of Plants, was inspired by psychologist Abraham Maslow's 'hierarchy of needs' theory which categorises human desires into five levels. It won the People's Choice Award out of the eight exhibits.

Kate said: "I'm still over the moon with the outcome, it's just incredible, but I am so tired I can barely stand up and walk because it has been such a mad, mad month.

"There's a huge sense of achievement, it's the culmination of eight months' worth of work and a dream that has been in my head since I went to college.

went to college.
"I've always aspired to do something like it, and to have not just achieved it but loved every second of it, has just been the most incredible experience ever."

Plant praise

A festival spokesperson described the garden as 'unique and thoughtprovoking' as it explored the relationship between plants and people. And they added it 'featuring a visually striking layout with structured planting and playful symbolism'. Kate's mostly self-funded inspi-

Kate's mostly self-funded inspiration was clearly a big hit with visitors.

She said: "It means more to me than any gold medal, because to have people's choice means that the people love it - the people who are going to buy my gardens and work with me, follow me and support me.

"Those are the most important

"Those are the most important people because they're the ones who have made it happen for me.

"Without all their support, I wouldn't have been there."

It was a diagnosis of post-natal depression ten years ago that got kate into gardening after it was suggested she do something that brought her joy.

She confessed that, when she first

She confessed that, when she first started, the only plants she knew the names of were petunia and a geranium.



A developing love of growing and plants inspired her to take an entrylevel RHS qualification at Pershore College and from there she has not looked back.

Wins at BBC Gardeners World Live events came quickly and became the launch pad for a new garden design career.

She confessed the blues were not entirely banished but added gardening was a great grounding force that steadied her on the down days.

"It's an escapism, it's creating an alternate reality that you can stabilise your emotions in because when you're in the garden and you're focused on planting a plant or growing a seed, you're really in the moment.

"You have to concentrate because if you don't sow the seed right, it won't grow, if you don't cut the right bit of the plant, it won't grow properly.

"As you go through that whole process of growing a garden, you're also growing yourself at the same time."

Her advice to anyone struggling with their mental health: "Take each day as it comes and on the good days just appreciate and literally go out and smell the roses."

Her next ambition is to return to Malvern and strike gold.

The charity will be equipping the ambulance with stretchers, lights and other equipment for its new role, saving lives in the northeast of Ukraine.

In the coming weeks, volunteers from the charity will load the finished vehicle with essential aid items and drive it to Ukraine.





CHILDREN and young people across the Midlands have been receiving targeted mental health support.
The move came ahead of Mental

Health Awareness Week which began on Monday and runs until Sunday (May 12 to 18). Mental Health Support Teams (MHST), which operate in in schools and colleges across the

region, are specially trained NHS staff that offer help and treatment for children and young people with their mental health, anxiety and depression.

The theme of Mental Health Awareness Week this year – as set by the Mental Health Foundation –

The Midlands now has 121
Mental Health Support Teams in schools and colleges.

The Midlands has an average

number of 216 children and young people who have contacted a MHST (with at least one attended appointment) for support from December 2023 to November last

This is above the national average of 214 contacts per team.

'Support is vital'

Giles Tinsley, programme director for Mental Health at NHS England in the Midlands, said: "During Mental Health Awareness Week and beyond, it is vital children and young people in the Midlands receive the help and support they need at school and col-

lege.
"By having support, students will gain confidence which so impor-



tant for their education, relation-

ships and home life.

"As well as helping them to thrive in the next steps of their odirection." education.

Parents and carers can help to look after a child or young person's mental health.

Tips for mental wellbeing

Among them are for people to undertake activities they enjoy and maybe join a club or group focusing on their interests, such as sport, music, reading or gaming. Residents can meet others with similar interests to themselves.

It is suggested people spend more time outdoors – nature is well documented as a mental health improver and it can also lead to social interactions. People are advised to go for walks, runs or bike rides – all proven to boost mental wellbe-

ing.

individuals who individuals who share the same interests, beliefs, faith or values and showing kindness to others this gives a sense of belonging, as well as boosting the recipi-ent of the kind act.

It could be as simple as starting a conversation or forging a friend-

People often think about others' kind acts but never say – expressing appreciation can boost the mental wellbeing of both people in these situations.

Caring for the local community

and environment, such as participating in litter-picks, community gardening or organising local

events can make people happier.
And welcoming new members to communities can also help. It could be as simple as people saying hello to a new neighbour, introducing themselves to a new colleague, inviting someone to a community event or recommending positive

Other tips include becoming part of an online community – for those who cannot get out or have mobility issues and volunteering or giving to charity. Helping oth-ers improves the sense of community and assisting at charity shops, foodbanks or rescue centres can lower stress and make people feel



Real drama in Miss Marple tale

REVIEW

MURDER, Margaret and Me, currently being per-formed by The Nonentities Kidderminster's Rose Theatre, tells the story of Agatha Christie and Margaret Rutherford – the actor who played the crime author's most famous character 'Miss

Marple' on the big screen.

This play explores the real reason why the acting legend and 'the funniest woman alive' did not want to take on the role that made her celebrated across the world.

This is a primarily about the col-lision of two worlds and clash of two characters – both with strong beliefs about their lives, art and how things should be done.

And, after twists, turns tension between them seemingly around every corner, the pair form an unlikely but lasting friendship.

With this being a two-hour, three hander, a lot fell on the actors' shoulders - all were seldom off

Laura Pearson perfectly portrayed genteel English author Christie with her prim and proper persona and clear passion for writing murder mysteries. She cleverly conveyed the character who lovingly switches between seriousness and wandering off in her creative head, coming up with elaborate murderous plots.

Likewise, Katy Ball was excellent

as the exuberant – sometimes even child-like – Rutherford, strutting



her stuff across the stage and telling tales from her celebrity past.

The way Pearson and Ball inter-

acted with each other – from aggression and intense dislike to their warm, almost fuzzy, friendship at the end – was wonderful to watch. They bounced off each other brilliantly throughout this entire emotional roller-coaster.

And, in between the warring pair, and equally effective in her

exchanges with the other two, was Joan Wakeman as The Spinster. You could tell she enjoyed every moment on the stage as the endearing, sometimes cheeky, go-between and 'almost narrator', keeping the audience up-to-speed. She also provided 'the light among the shade' with copious humorous observa-tions - crucial to a piece with so much tension.

All three characters persist-

ently 'broke the fourth wall' as alternated between relaying their thoughts and feelings to those watching before interacting with each other and then back again.

The first half of the play – pretty much scene-setting for what was to come – was, I feel, more for Agatha Christie fans and a tad slow.

But, the second half was a much quicker-paced tour de force. It began with all three characters making humorous (almost stand-up in parts) observations about mar-

At the beginning of act two, Wakeman received some of the biggest laughs of the evening with these utterances, firmly cementing The Spinster's place in the audience's hearts.

And you could not take your eyes off Pearson and Ball as they deliv-

off Pearson and Ball as they delivered some impressive monologues which gripped us all as the play reached its climax.

Such was the writing, combined with the actors' portrayals of their roles, you could hear a pin drop for the whole of the last 15 to 20 minutes as traffic times and shocking utes as tragic times and shocking secrets were revealed and Christie's and Rutherford's stories were con-

In more than two decades of reviewing shows and longer watching them, I have never heard a theatre so silent for such a prolonged period of time.

Most probably headed home with

mobile phones in hand to Wikipedia the factual elements of Margaret, Murder and Me (that's exactly what I did). And if you do, it will confirm this was a real enthralling true tale that just had to be told – an incredthat just had to be told – an incredible story you probably never knew and, having watched this show, wish you had been told it sooner. The remaining performances take place at 7.30pm tonight (Friday) and tomorrow (Saturday)








Flowers not mowers this month will help encourage the wildlife

THIS MONTH, botanical charity Plantlife is championing 'No Mow May'.

The simple but powerful cam-paign encourages gardeners to pause their lawnmowers and let wildflowers flourish.

With nearly 7.5million acres of meadows lost since the 1930s, the UK's pollinators and insect-eating birds are in decline as their habitats

British Garden Centres has put together some hints on how people can participate in No Mow May and transform their gardens into vital refuges for bees, butterflies, and other wildlife.

Five simple tips

Leave the lawn – A perfectly mown, striped lawn is like a green desert for bees. Leave the lawn-mower in the shed, and the gar-den becomes more wildlife-friendly. Flowers and plants can grow through the grass, such as daisies, dandelions, creeping buttercups, and common mouse-ear flowers The sweet flower heads will attract beneficial insects. These are great for pollinating insects, whilst taller grass and wild plants will also provide food and shelter for animals



Longer grass and the blooms which come with them attract a variety of wildlife, including bees and other pollinators. s

like mice, hedgehogs, frogs, toads,

nd newts.

Plant wildflowers – Mixes and seed bombs can be sown with results visible in less than eight weeks. These concoctions contain weeks. These concording contains nectar-rich species such as paper daisies, cornflowers, poppies, camomile, corn marigold, and forgetme-nots. Once grown, they create an environment for garden wild-life, providing habitats and food

Small steps - Rewilding does not mean leaving the whole lawn overgrown all month long. People can participate in No Mow May by mowing a path to the shed and a patio to make everything in the outdoor space accessible. Those not wanting to dedicate the whole garden to No Mow May can leave just a small patch – it all makes a positive difference.

Go organic – Avoid using chemical weedkillers which can harm both wildflowers and plants in the lawn. They can also damage the soil. Instead of spraying weeds to get rid of them, pull them out by hand – this natural approach promotes a healthier garden ecosystem.



Gardeners are being urged to refrain from mowing their lawns in May to let the flowers flourish, s

Change the mowing routine – No Mow May is not just for this month, it can be done allyear-round and will benefit wildlife more if undertaken in this way. A Plantlife survey revealed the people with the most flowers in their lawns were those who mowed once every four weeks, Keep lawns to 2ins to 3ins - this encourages low-growing flowering plants, such as clovers and daisies. Allowing the grass to grow longer also leads to deeper roots, meaning your lawn ne less water and will be healthier.

Amy Stubbs, project and develop

ment manager at British Garden Centres, said: "By simply paus-ing our mowers this May, we can transform our gardens into thriving havens for wildflowers and wildlife, navers for whollowers and wholling, making a powerful difference for pollinators, biodiversity, and our planet. No Mow May is a small act with a mighty impact. Letting your lawn go wild is the first step to restoring the balance we've lost and attracting beneficial insects back to our gardens.

Support cash extended for another year

PEOPLE across Worcestershire who would otherwise struggle with bills and paying for essentials such as food will be able to apply for financial support now that the Household Support Fund will continue to part year.

continue to next year.

Funded by the UK government, the assistance will run until March, 2026 through a range of different schemes.

In Worcestershire, \$6.95million of funding has been used to extend energy support delivered by Act on Energy. This provides assistance with the cost of household energy, energy bill debt and new heating systems for eligible households.

Food voucher support during school holidays will continue until the end of the summer holidays, to help those families in receipt of free school meals.

One-off funding is available in cash vouchers for new pension credit recipients. Other pensioners, carers or people with a disability on a low income will be able to access cash vouchers and support through the Worcestershire Advice Network, led by Age UK Wyvern. Also available will be an additional one-off vouch-

er for low-income households with high-energy-use medical devices..

And there will also be additional activity focused on longer-term preventative advice and support to make more lasting change for residents.

District councils have been allocated around a quarter of the overall funding and are being supporting a range of other measures in local communities.

Audi to launch new electric GT

AUDI is launching an additional version of the e-tron GT that offers an attractive new



entry point to the range.

The e-tron GT quattro can call on up to 584PS to deliver impressive performance, while also covering up to 384 miles when its battery is fully charged. The new entry level Grand Tourer is available to order in the UK from June 24 priced from £88,555 (OTR), and deliveries are due to begin in August.

Audi UK Director Jose Miguel Aparicio said: "Just by looking at the car, it's easy to see why it strikes a chord with our customers, and when you also factor in the versatility it offers in terms of range performance, while also covering

versatility it offers in terms of range and charging capability, and its exceptional blend of performance, practicality and comfort, the sheer depth of its appeal really becomes clear.

"This new version carries all those strengths through to a new price point that is sure to make

this beautiful Grand Tourer an even more attractive proposition.

The Audi e-tron GT quattro rounds off the existing GT family, which comprises the S e-tron GT, RS e-tron GT and RS e-tron GT performance. It has a system output of 503PS (584PS with Launch put of 303FS (584FS with Launch Control). Thanks to a gross battery capacity of 105kWh (net 97kWh) and a range of up to 384 miles, it can very capably fulfil the Grand Tourer role but is equally at home in city traffic.

The newcomer also features an impressive charging capacity of up to 320kW. This means that only short charging stops are needed, as around 177 miles of range can be

regained in just 10 minutes.

The Audi Gran Turismo features large wheels, a sleek coupe-like silhouette, and an extended wheelcontribute to the vehicle's
