

Former Army medic rallies call for more volunteers for charity

"It's really been a lifeline for me and thousands of other veterans. but it needs to recruit more volunteers so it can support more men and women who have served.

"As well as providing clinical, mental health, and welfare support services through a team of dedi-cated advisors, the charity works

with groups to support veterans and their families, to connect with each other and their communities through sports and social activi-

"These activities can be an important part of recovery and the charity wants to expand this activity in the Worcestershire area but, to do this,

Help for Heroes is currently supporting 26 veterans across Worcestershire.
The charity aims to work with

volunteers, national and local organisations to offer activities for veterans and their families, such as wheelchair basketball, archery, and rowing, as well as other activities, including photography and creative

And it is also hoping to expand its regular drop-in cafe social ses-

On average, five people are medi-cally discharged from the UK military every day. Some veterans must find new ways to live with a physi-cal disability. Others face complex mental trauma. Many feel cut off from society, friends and even fam-

ily.
Tim added: "I know personally what a valuable job Help for Heroes does.

"There are more than 21,200 vet-erans living in Worcestershire area and if we can recruit people who

are able to give a couple of hours a week, the charity can do more for

local people.

"We also need people who are happy to help us with fundraising

events.

"Last year our volunteer fundraisers helped us out with bucket collections at supermarkets and other locations."

Tim urged anyone interested in finding out more about volunteering and those with a passion for a sport, creative or social activity they think they could share with veterans to get in touch.

A full colour, illustrated booklet commemorating the history of the parish, including the order of the Bicentennial Mass will be available on the day.



Park revamp set to get under way

MUCH-LOVED park in Kidderminster is set to have its £3million improvement project progressed, with £2.4million funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF).

Although the project for Brinton Park has faced a series of unforeseen delays including the several badgers' sets being discovered - work to enhance facilities, protect local wildlife and celebrate the park's rich heritage is now scheduled to begin this summer.

A key part of the improve-ments includes replacing the aging Sons of Rest Pavilion, which has sadly been found to be in much worse condition than first expected. An independent inspection by contractors confirmed seri-ous structural problems and, for safety reasons, the council has been advised by structural engineers the building will need to be demolished and rebuilt. The proposal will be discussed at a forthcoming planning application.

The plans for the new building will reflect the historic character of the origi-nal pavilion while offering improved community facilities including a new cafe space, terrace, ornamental pond and landscaping.

Work in the park will start with the construction of a new artificial badger sett to protect local wildlife

Demolition of the current pavilion will follow shortly afterwards.

Plans for the new pavilion are scheduled to be considered at the next available planning committee meeting.

There will be a new cafe

within the pavilion, looking out onto a new terrace which, in turn, overlooks a new orna-mental pond.

Other improvements for attracting more wildlife include management of the woodland. installing bat boxes and landscaping with new flower beds and shrub planting.



New panels installed in next stage of flood scheme

BEWDLEY Town Council has shared the latest update on the construction of a flood risk management scheme.

It says work on the Bewdley Left Bank Flood Risk Management

Scheme is progressing well.

The major milestone for last week was the arrival of the glass panel components on site and these are starting to be installed along the flood wall.

The glass panels will bring the flood wall up to full height when completed.

The necessary tests have already been completed for the glass panels at an off-site testing

Among them were a 'static leakage test' – this is where water is held against the panels to a required level to test for leakage of the seals – and a 'dynamic impact test' when a heavy object is released and hits into the pan-els to test their durability with water next to them.

A 'current leakage test' has also been carried out. This is where a turbulent flow of water is forced past the screen.

This technique is also used to test the seals and ensure they are water tight.

Over the bank holiday week-end, Severn Trent Water made improvements to the current drainage system.

A one-way traffic measure was put in place while this work was carried out.

A POINGANT CEREMONY took place to rededicate a locomotive named after a Royal Navy aircraft carrier which sank with the tragic loss of over 1,200 lives.

Class 50 diesel locomotive, number 50033

motive, number 50033 named Glorious, after HMS Glorious, was rededicated at the Severn Valley Railway's Kidderminster station earlier this month in a ceremony to commemorate next week's 85th anniversary of the ship's

sinking.

Representatives from
the Severn Valley Railway,
the Class 50 Alliance and the Royal Navy attended, along with relatives of some of those who died on the ship, while Sea Cadets from Worcester and Sandwell provided an honour guard.

The railway's managing director, Gus Dunster, opened the ceremony with poignant words on the history of the relationship between the names the Class locomotives bear and 50 locomotives bear and their Naval counterparts, before Commanding Officer Ben Dando, 825 Naval Air Squadron, paid a heartfelt tribute to the legacy of HMS Glorious' sinking and the bravery of the crew and her escorts.

escorts.

The locomotive's name-plate was re-unveiled during the ceremony and the Last Post was played by Bugler, Squadron Leader (Retired), Jason Davenhill. The serv-

ice ended with the Rev Paul Roberts giving a Blessing. HMS Glorious and her escorts, HMS Ardent and HMS Acasta, were all sunk by German battleships Scharnhorst and Gneisenau in the North Sea on June 8, 1940, with the loss of 1,531

And 1,207 of those who died were men and boys on HMS Glorious in what was the Royal Navy's worst loss of the Second World War, resulting in the tragedy being subject to a 100-year secrecy order by the Board of Inquiry.

Locomotive 50033 entered British Rail service in 1968 and was named 'Glorious' in 1977. It is now preserved and based at the Severn Valley Railway.



Mum and baby enjoy a very special moment

A MOTHER and her newborn baby who both needed life support at the same time were able to have their first physical contact, thanks to caring staff at Worcestershire Royal Hospital.

This extremely rare event where both mother, Helen and her newborn daughter, Maeve needed the help of ventilators to breathe, led to a touching moment where clinical staff brought them together for Helen to have her first skin-to-skin contact with her newborn daughter despite both still requiring intensive care.

daugnter despite both still requiring intensive care. Helen has a rare condition called Myasthenia Gravis which can cause muscle weakness and shortness of breath

In this case some of Helen's antibodies appear to have crossed to Maeve who had to be admitted to the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit at Worcestershire Royal Hospital very shortly after birth with weakness and breathing difficulties.

At first Maeve required

some basic breathing support, but her condition worsened and she needed intubation and ventilation - procedures where a tube is inserted to open the airway and then a machine is used to help the patient breathe.

Shortly after delivering Maeve, Helen's condition also deteriorated and doctors had to admit her to the Intensive Care Unit for intubation and ventilation to help her breathe as well. Due to her condition, Helen couldn't visit Maeve in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit and so hadn't been able to hold her newborn daughter.

As Helen and Maeve both remained stable on their ventilators, the neonatal team at Worcestershire Royal Hospital worked out a plan to transport Maeve using a Neonatal Transport Incubator with a ventilator to the adult Intensive Care Unit to be by her mother's side.

When Maeve arrived in the unit, staff were able to place her on her mother's chest for their first skin-to-skin contact, with husband and father Justin

watching on alongside Helen's parents. A couple of days later, thanks to great teamwork and flexibility from both departments, staff were also able to bring Helen to visit Maeve in the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit while both were still on ventilators.

In between this time, staff took photos of Maeve and placed them around Helen's bed for her to see and even used iPads to give Helen a FaceTime video call with her newborn halv

newborn baby.
Justin said: "From day one, the doctors, nurses, and entire team made us feel supported and cared for – not just Maeve, but us as her parents too.

team made us feel supported and cared for – not just Maeve, but us as her parents too. "Whether it was explaining every little detail or just offering a reassuring smile when we needed it most, they turned a scary time into something filled with compassion and strength. We'll always be grateful."

Helen has now been discharged as medically fit and is doing well. She is able to visit Maeve in the Neonatal Unit while Maeve continues to be monitored.






